

This May the Archbishops of Canterbury and York are inviting every church in England to join a week of prayer leading up to the Feast of Pentecost which the church celebrates on Sunday 15 May. At the heart of the many different prayer-based activities happening all over England will be the prayer that Jesus taught us The Lord's Prayer.

The Lord's Prayer is relatively short, a mere 70 words, but they are enduring words, still taught in schools, words that most people still know off by heart. The Lord's Prayer is said by billions of people in hundreds of languages and it continues to give us comfort and draw us nearer to God. Here are two versions, one in traditional language the other in more modern language. Both expressing the same profound truths.

Perhaps for each day in May you can commit to pray the

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Lord's Prayer, in its simplicity it offers beautiful words expressing profound truths. Through it we receives words of comfort, hope, challenge, forgiveness and the hope for a more just world 'Thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as in heaven.

Another of the Archbishops' suggestions is that you could commit to pray for five friends

daily. One way to do this is to find five small stones and write each of the people on your list onto each of the stones. Place them on your desk, bedside table or fireplace as a reminder to pray.

Alternatively, you could place each stone in a different room of your home and pray for each person as you enter or leave the room.

Below is an acrostic that can help us to pray.

Using the BLESS acrostic can help us to focus on all of the felt needs of those we pray for:

- Body – health, protection, energy
- Labour – employment/unemployment, retirement, adequate income
- Emotional – inner peace, joy, wisdom, insight, patience
- Social – healthy relationships between spouses, parents, children, friends;

This moated manor house has been a sanctuary since the 15th Century and was the home of the Ferrers Family for 500 years. Baddesley Clinton was a sanctuary not only for the Ferrers family but other persecuted Catholics in its priest's holes. The gardens include fish pools, walled garden and a lakeside walk.

Hempcroft Allotment News—Special Report, The Nasio Trust in Kenya

During my most recent trip to Western Kenya with The Nasio Trust I got to visit their sustainable farming project. In a continued effort to make the communities they support as independent as possible, Nasio are teaching the orphans to grow and tend crops on the land and in greenhouses for their own use. They then sell any surplus at market. Relatives and guardians of the orphans tend the crops on a regular basis and when I was there in 2014 the charity was very much hoping to involve the orphans themselves in a practical way so they could learn farming skills that would help to sustain them and their communities for life.

It is difficult to compare the lives of these children with those of our own in this comfortable corner of the world. The orphans of Western Kenya face a daily struggle to survive, often without

It surprised me how so many of the vegetables being grown in Kenyan soil are also familiar sights on our own allotments – onions, tomatoes, cabbages, kale; we can even grow sugar cane if we want to! Who knew? I started to hatch a plan for my own, rather neglected, allotment and when I got back I had a meeting with Russell Leigh, Headmaster at Dorchester St Birinus and Nancy Hunt who is the founder and Head of the Nasio Trust. Both were extremely enthusiastic about the idea of starting a joint project between the centres in Musanda and Mumias, Kenya, and our school here in Dorchester.

Now, thanks to the huge support from the allotment manager, Bill Downey, and Edward Metcalfe, the allotment has been trimmed and rotavated ready for pupils in Dorchester to start planting. It is hoped that they can grow many of the same things being grown in Kenya but also a few things that they don't, so that they can compare notes with the children there through letters, pictures, Facebook and even Skype. We hope that striking up this connection and relationship in such a hands-on way will prove an ongoing inspiration to our children. Who knows what might come of it?

Of course, fitting the necessary routine of tending the allotment into the school timetable is challenging and requires a lot of adult help and ongoing support. So far, we have had an extraordinary contribution from Bill and others who have worked incredibly hard, preparing the allotment for us to use and we owe them a huge debt of gratitude. We now want as many parents as possible to be involved but we also need the skills, experience and knowledge of allotments holders, and other local residents to spend some time, either with or without the children, offering help and advice.

any adult support and learning to raise crops to feed themselves will transform their lives. The children of Dorchester do not need to grow vegetables to survive but it struck me as I looked across the lush, green Kenyan landscape, just how much these skills could, nevertheless, enrich their lives, especially if they learned in conjunction with children who have such a vested interest in survival.



Focus on... Hurst Water Meadow Trust

Celebrating 20 years this year is one of Dorchester's most valued resources: the Hurst Water Meadow, owned and looked after by the Hurst Water Meadow Trust on behalf of our community. I am sure that we all know the water meadow on the island between two branches of the

mentioned in any documents until the late 14th century. Following the dissolution of the monasteries the Abbey estate went to the Crown in 1536, and then in 1585 passed into private hands. Various families farmed it for the next 400 years until it was sold in 1980 to ARC (later Hanson Trust).

jobs at the right times. And a wide range of skills is required.

May is a wonderful time to enjoy the Hurst, and that is when a lot of work is done on maintaining footpaths. And, of course, the perennial job of picking up litter.

Much of the land management is carried out by volunteers using traditional methods such as scything, coppicing and hedge laying. Volunteers come from many local towns and villages including Wallingford and Burcot as well as Dorchester. They cover a wide range of ages from young men studying at school to the more senior citizen. Into the latter category falls the Sonning Common Green Gym, who descend on the Hurst en masse from time to time to provide labour as their means of getting a good work out and to share their vast knowledge and love of conservation.

Work on larger trees has to be carried out by tree surgeons, and, in a normal year, this is the biggest outlay that the Trust has, accounting for more than half of its overall budget. There are around 150 to 180 willows on the site and the Trust budgets to pollard around 10 to 15 each year. The large Black Poplar on the Hurst has had nearly £2,000 spent on tree surgery over the last twenty years, and that's just one of the many tall trees on site.

All this work is not done solely for the benefit

Thames, with the footpath connecting the village to Overy Mill. Eighteen acres that provide a wonderful open space for us all to walk, exercise, do heavy duty circuit training, walk our dogs, go fishing or just enjoy the changing seasons. The trust also owns Old Bridge Meadow, adjoining the bridge on its west side, and now, Overy Mead Piece, which connects Old Bridge Meadow to the River Thames. This was officially opened on 21 April by Graham Scholey, Conservation Technical Specialist at the Environment Agency.

To find out more about the Trust, Dorchester News has been talking to Andrew Clements, treasurer since its inception.

The name 'Hurst' probably comes from the Old English 'hyrst'. Although this was generally taken to mean 'wooded hill', which the Hurst clearly is not, in Middle English the term was used for a sandbank in a river (or at sea, as in Hurst Castle at Milford on Sea in Hampshire). The Hurst was described in an early nineteenth century document as a 'sandy loam', which reinforces that suggestion.

It would almost certainly have been part of the Abbey grounds from the middle of the 12th century, although it is not specifically

From them it went to Dorchester Fisheries in 1991, and in 1996 most of the Hurst was bought by the Trust.

The Trust had been formed in 1995 following the collapse of Dorchester Fisheries. The southernmost five acres had already been sold, but around 160 donations from the residents of Dorchester, together with a substantial contribution from the Parish Council, raised £31,000 to buy the remaining 18 acres. The campaign to raise the money and bring the Hurst effectively into village ownership, was spearheaded by Dr Pritchard, a local GP, who, together with Maurice Day and others, saw the opportunity to ensure that the meadows were retained as a village amenity.

Being owned by the Trust, a charity, the Hurst is effectively a village enterprise. The current nine trustees are all Dorchester residents and the aims of the Trust include preserving, conserving and protecting the Hurst for the benefit of the public. So we can be assured that they are always working on behalf of the village to provide a welcome amenity for all.

To do this requires a lot of planning and many hours of work throughout the year, working with the seasons to do the right

of the people of Dorchester, however. Conservation is one of the Trust's aims and that has a far larger context. In our world of increasing urbanisation and global warming the conservation of water meadows is a national priority. The Hurst is part of Conservation Target Area No.27, and so is part of Dorchester's contribution to the national objectives of maintaining biodiversity and conserving wildlife.

In 2015, after two years of hard work, the Trust received a £36,000 BIFFA Award that would allow it to purchase the strip of land along the left bank of the Thames from Old Bridge Meadow down to the Thames. This has been named Overy Mead Piece. This now gives unfettered access from Henley Road down to the Thames Footpath, and is the latest acquisition since Old Bridge Meadow in 2009.

What of the future? The Trust would really like to be given the opportunity to reunite the Hurst by bringing under its control the five acres to the south. This would enable it to manage the complete island that is the Hurst for the benefit of Dorchester residents and others.

The Demesne Field, to the north of the Hurst and between the village and the by-pass, has been the subject of much discussion recently. Would the Trust

have a role to play here? Trustees have been monitoring this situation since 2004, and registered an interest with SODC in 2008, so any interest now is not just a reaction to recent stories about potential development. However, with the Neighbourhood Development Plan recommending that the Demesne Field should become a wildlife-rich lowland meadow should it cease to be viable as agricultural land,

then there may be a role for the Trust. At 35 acres though it would massively increase the amount of land to manage, putting strain on resources.

How can the people of Dorchester contribute? The easiest way is to use the Hurst Water Meadow, Old Bridge Meadow, and Overy Mead Piece and to use them responsibly. This means picking up your litter, picking up your dog mess, even if it is off the path, and not leaving logs and branches hidden in long grass after your children and dogs have finished playing with them. Local farmers cut the long grass, but large pieces of wood can inflict damage to their machinery and they may not be so willing to continue after a broken blade or two.

You can help by volunteering – litter pickers are always needed, but you may need training to do some other activities. If you have a relevant skill or knowledge you would be particularly welcome.

Or you can contribute financially. Like all responsible charities the Trust has its reserves, but also needs to continue to raise money to cover the costs of maintenance and preservation. So leave them something in your will, and then go heavy duty circuit training round the Hurst, or perhaps try out that scythe...

Subsidised Bus Services

As reported in the April edition of Dorchester News, subsidised buses 97 and 114 are expected to continue operating to 20 July 2016 (end of school year). Thereafter 114 may be designated as a school bus, while 97 is very likely to be terminated.

The Parish Council is pleased with the 15 responses to the loose-leaf questionnaire received so far. The responses indicate:

- Most survey participants think that the Parish Council should take the lead in exploring the possibility of a local mini-bus service and support working with other villages.
- Most would use a Parish Council provided, reliable and minimal cost mini-bus service that picks up passengers at existing bus stops and also in Queen Street.
- Most would be prepared to pay for individual journeys.
- One individual recommendation is for a minibus to Wallingford twice a week. Others asked for a service to Clifton Hampden and Berinsfield Surgeries and Berinsfield Post Office.

The Council would like to know the needs of more Villagers so that options can be considered during April and May so that any replacement service can be established by July 2016.

The Dorchester Archive

The archive

The archive aims to collect items of relevance to Dorchester's social history, both as a record of village life, and to support Museum exhibits. The Archive team from the Museum and Historical Society (Denise Line, Margot Metcalfe and Gail Thomas) has been busy examining and classifying new items, and rationalising the existing archive, prior to adding hundreds of new records to the archive database later in the year. Margot and Gail have been working mainly on documents, and Denise mainly on photographs. Some recent donations have included:

- Many fascinating items from Mary Tame's collections
- Material from the family of the late Miss Anne Bowditch of Bishops Court, including pictures of Dorchester, archaeological finds, maps, photographs, records of gymkhanas and horse shows, and memorabilia relating to the many activities of Miss Bowditch's late mother, Mrs Stephanie Bowditch (evacuees in WW2, the Primrose League, Red Cross....).
- Photographs, including two postcards of the dedication of the War Memorial from Marilyn Lines (née Bumpass), and a photo from Cedric Cherrill of Tegg's garage in the High Street, behind which in the 1930s were found the Roman pots exhibited in the Museum (donated by Mrs Hilleard, née Tegg).
- Papers and photographs from now disbanded local organisations - DOTS, DADAV, DARTS
- Roman coin found by Lionel Bridge at 4 Queen's Close 30 years ago

Dorchester Parish Magazine

Mary's collection included a few more precious copies of the earliest Dorchester Parish Magazines: No. 326 (August 1915), No 330 (December 1915), No 340 (November 1916), No 342 (January 1917), No 372 (May 1919). We already had a bound collection from the first issue (1888) to 1914 inclusive, and in the Bowditch collection are many issues from the same period – it would be wonderful to complete the set for 1915-1920, and get them bound to ensure their future preservation and accessibility. We have complete collections of all the later parish magazines in their various formats.

Even apparently small or irrelevant items, like a receipt from a local shop, are part of the Dorchester story. We can scan photographs if you don't want to give them away permanently. So we appeal to residents and families, please, before throwing away any objects, documents, books, pictures or photographs relating to Dorchester and its archaeology or social history, or your family, show them to one of us, or bring them into the Museum when it is open.

What we don't collect

Space in the Museum, especially for the Museum shop, and for storage of both archives and stock, is at a premium, so we can no longer store material which is the administrative responsibility of another body. As a result, the Parish Council has deposited the contents of its chest at the Oxfordshire History Centre (County Record Office) where they will be properly conserved and catalogued, and the public will

have ready access. Similarly, a large collection of files relating to the recent Abbey refurbishment will be stored by the PCC.

Nor can we take in items which may be of general interest but of no relevance to Dorchester.

Former Residents

We have been contacted by the son of former Dorchester resident Ronald Arnold, who at age 19 in 1941 was living at the Farmers' Arms, and joined the Home Guard. He later served as a despatch rider, including at the Battle of Caen, and received the Légion d'Honneur from the French Government in 2014. Ron, now 89, lives in Romford, Essex, but we hope he will visit Dorchester in the summer and meet any of you who remember him. Denise has sent his son a very clear photo of the Home Guard, so we hope Ron may be able to identify some of his fellows.

Margot and Denise are using various sources, including some from Mary Tame, to work up the story of two young 19th century migrants to Australia, Charles and Sarah Ellen Swadling.

Exhibition

An exhibition is planned for June to mark the Queen's 90th birthday – more details to come.

World War I and the Belgian refugees – the Dorchester story – update

Last year we gave you the story of the Belgian refugees who came to Dorchester in 1914, set in the wider context of that crisis, and the role Britain played. We can now, as we promised, tell you what happened to those refugees, as described in an article from a 1915 issue of the Dorchester Parish Magazine (alas, we do not have the original in the archive).

Dorchester hosted refugee families for nine months, until May 1915. Four families came altogether, two at a time, and were housed in the cottage mentioned in our earlier article. Altogether 24 refugees were 'entertained', with 12 to 15 persons at the same time in the house – quite a crowd! However, rural life did not suit them; 'they found the country too dull, and expressed a wish to go to a town, so we sent them back to Earl's Court, London'. Possibly some national records might help in identifying them.

Subscriptions and donations raised £97 17s 8½d, of which £87 6s 2d were spent, the balance being distributed to the official Committee for helping Belgian Victims of the War who have not left their own country (£10 10s 0d) and 1s 6½d to the Navy Vegetable Fund in the village.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

The Dorchester NDP has reached a major milestone in the process. After a lot of hard work, research and in depth analysis over a period of more than 3 years the Plan was sent to South Oxfordshire District Council on 30 March for them to make an initial assessment that it conforms to all the required processes. They will also confirm that it contains all the elements that are necessary for the size and type of village in which we all live. As well as SODC there are a number of other 'statutory consultees' including adjacent villages, Natural England, Historic England, The EA, local utility providers and major local organisations and employers, that were also sent a copy requesting their comments. All the consultees have 6 weeks in which to make any comments.

We should point out that this is an interim process to 'test the water' and depending on the comments there may need to be a number of additions and amendments before the final plan can be completed. Hopefully these will not be too extensive and we will be able to send the completed plan

A Goat of Many Colours

Often the Abbey is leased out to venerable Orchestras such as the OSJ and Choral societies. But what if it were to run and promote its own Folk Concert?

The idea of bringing the sounds of acclaimed musicians of the 60s and 70s with their modern day equivalents seemed novel and was put to the Abbey in January by David Phillip and myself.

Booking named acts for events is financially risky. Bravely the Abbey PCC agreed and so on **Saturday 25 June** a heady and unusual music event will be a first for Dorchester Abbey:

The psychedelic sound that influenced generations of musicians during the 1960s, the mystical and whimsical tunes of the Incredible String Band will dance around the Abbey's ancient stones following the Trembling Bells rendition of their latest album and much acclaimed fifth album *Wide Majestic Aire*.

The challenge now is whether we can fill seats. The George has kindly sponsored the event by putting up the nine member ensemble. But are there enough Incredible String Band fans out there to come to a rural village in Oxfordshire? Will the Trembling Bells fan base stretch from Glasgow and Oxford to our little village? Time will tell, but it is only right that I let the fans and the merely curious know what they are in for.

So what can one expect from Mike Heron, one of the most influential performers from the 60s that you've never heard of and his young protégés the Trembling Bells?

The Trembling Bells recreate the beautiful masterpieces performed by the Incredible String Band in the 1960s with the added sparkle of the amazing voice of Lavinia




Blackwall. Mike Heron sings and is joined by his daughter, singer songwriter Georgia Seddon. The result is a mystical journey through the experimental music of the late 1960s with songs that recapture the innocence and optimism of the time, including music from *Layers of the Onion* described as an acoustic *Sgt Pepper*. Marianne Faithfull effused: 'Mick and I loved them; I felt they made that record just for me'.

Rowan Williams chose their *Hedgehog Song* for as one of his Desert Island discs. The Rolling Stones, the Beatles and Led Zeppelin were among their fans, Billy Connolly remembered them, saying: 'I just love it, it means as much to me today as it did back then, you know, wee songs about caterpillars, I just love it.'

Although the Bells beautifully recreate the ISB music this is no mere cover tribute. The Trembling Bells in their own right have been achieving critical acclaim, as the band, formed in 2008 by singer songwriter, drummer Alex Neilson, busily tours the UK. They will be performing songs from their new album *Wide Majestic Aire* which received four stars from Mojo magazine and has been played live on BBC Radio 6. A keen ear will pick up their rich and varied prog rock and folk influences from Fairport Convention and Steeleye Span to Pink Floyd. The Bells are original experimental and inspiring. Anyone who loves this style of folk music is in for a treat.

'Wide Majestic Aire is a mellifluous relative of Shane MacGowan's Broad Majestic Shannon, and features the meltwater vocals of Lavinia Blackwell' Mojo

The result is a mystical journey from the artful and creative young talent of the Bells to the experimental music of the late



An entertaining new format for presenting an opera comes to Dorchester Abbey from New Zealand this year, in two performances, on **4 June** and on **15 October**. On each occasion the new format, called 'narropera', will present a Mozart opera.

'Narropera' (narrated opera) is arranged for a chamber music ensemble of three musicians, a soprano, a violinist and a pianist who doubles as the narrator. The art of story-telling is used to relate the opera and within the storyline, nine or ten arias are performed. Before each aria, its text is narrated: the listener therefore understands both the context of the aria and what the aria is expressing. Narropera's motto is 'beauty, clarity and entertainment'. No narropera performance is longer than 90 minutes and each is presented without an interval.

Narropera was invented by New Zealander, Haydn Rawstron, a former Christopher Tatton organ scholar at Christ Church, Oxford, as a response to the earthquakes in Christchurch, New Zealand, where Haydn was brought up. Conceived merely as a stop-gap at a time when the city's performing venues were rendered unusable, the first performances proved so popular with the public, that narropera has become a way of life for Haydn and his young German wife, the renowned soprano Dorothee Jansen. In just three years, the Mozart Narropera Trio has honed the format, founded two narropera festivals, arranged six operas for the format and given nearly fifty performances of them in four countries: Germany, Isle of Man, UK and in New Zealand.
