Talking Point

The first of May is exactly half way between the Spring Equinox and the Summer Solstice and as the first day of summer its celebrations welcome the season for growth and fertility with many traditions across the world. It seems the month of May was always a time for festivals and in some places there is still maypole dancing, Morris Dancers, and the crowning of a May Queen. Locally of course in Oxford the choir of Magdalene College sing from the top of the tower to welcome May morning.

In 1889 1st May was chosen as International Workers Day to commemorate the struggle by workers for an eight-hour working day. It seems ironic that this has developed into the current May Day parades that show off military might and the means of destruction rather than improved working conditions. What a contrast!

In the church May is a season of transition and transformation. The Easter season draws to a close with Ascension Day when the resurrected Jesus leaves his disciples to tell his story and, with the subsequent coming of the Holy Spirit, the early church emerges. Preceding Ascension Day are rogation days which often include prayers of protection for growing crops and, when the ceremony of beating the bounds

takes place, local communities.

A late Easter means Ascension Day does not fall until 26th May and therefore Whitsun (or Pentecost) not until the beginning of June. By then hopefully we can expect nature to be in full bloom. The coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the church echoes this fullness of life. The Spirit that is a transformative gift and shows us the right path to tread. A path that surely does not include an endless show of military might, not only on parade but also used against neighbours. Let us, therefore, continue to pray, not only for protection of our crops and communities, but also for peace with iustice for all.

Keith Parry will talk on

An A to W of Bridges, from Abingdon to Wallingford



Bridges across the Thames have an important role in the river's history. Some, notably Abingdon and Wallingford, are very old, built initially to support the wool industry: they were the only stone structures across the river between Oxford and London Bridge until the middle of the eighteenth century. An early bridge at Shillingford is more speculative and could be one of the very few bridges across the Thames that ceased operation for several centuries. It was rebuilt, along with those at Clifton Hampden and Sutton Courtenay, as part of the road transport revolution late in the eighteenth century.

Keith Parry, after thirty year's research experience in the agrochemical industry, 'retired' to develop his interest in history, gaining a Diploma and then an MSc in English Local History at Oxford University. As a voluntary researcher for the Maidenhead Heritage Centre, he worked with the Stanley Spencer Gallery on the history of beer and malt manufacture in Cookham, based on the remaining buildings and the paintings and writings of Stanley Spencer. This research was published as 'Stanley Spencer and the Cowls of Cookham', Berkshire Old and New 2019, pp.16-33. As well as lecturing at Oxford, Keith wrote on 'Parliamentary Enclosure in Oxfordshire' for The Historical Atlas of Oxfordshire, building on his MSc dissertation: 'The Defence of Cookham Commons from 1800 to 1850'. Current research includes the history and maintenance of early wooden bridges over the river Thames, an article on Marlow's Wooden Bridge 1180 to 1820 is forthcoming in Construction History. Keith is also Treasurer and Trustee of The Historic Towns Trust; an atlas of Oxford has recently been published.

Two books for younger readers



Grimwood by Nadia Shireen (pb fiction, £6.99) is one of Wallingford Bookshop owner Ali's best new recommendations for 7-9 year olds. It's choc-a-block with hand-drawn illustrations and has a *Tom-Gates*-esque feel. Laugh-out-loud funny, the story is about two fox cubs, Ted and Nancy, who are on the run from a scary cat in the big city and who seek sanctuary in the woods. On arrival, they

meet a host of quirky animal characters whose help they need when the scary cat, Princess Buttons, arrives on the scene. Caitlin Moran described this book as 'Like *Watership Down*, but funny'. Marvellous.

Aimed at the 8-12 age range, Stealth: Access Denied by Jason Rohan (pb fiction, £7.99) offers action and adventure in abundance. This is the first in a new series and is similar in theme to Horowitz's Alex Rider and Muchamore's Cherrub books. Arun and his best friend Donna are regular school kids, with a big secret – they are secret S.T.E.A.L.T.H agents whose job it is to solve crimes and save lives. When



Arun's dad goes missing, Arun discovers that his dad also kept secrets: he was working on a classified technology project and has been kidnapped by those who want to steal the ideas. This fast-paced story is sure to tempt even the most reluctant reader.





Old Herbaceous Saturday 2 April 2022 Dorchester Village Hall

'You can't stay angry for long can you, not in a garden?'

This one man play is a sensitive adaptation of Reginald Arkell's novel of the same name and is a nostalgic delight from beginning to end. It cleverly conveys not just its gentle story but also the essential niceness of a Head Gardener, Herbert Pinegar, who lived and worked on a country estate his entire life after a childhood spent as a slightly crippled orphan, adopted by a truly kindly lady who inspired in him his love for gardening.

As we see Pinegar pottering around his greenhouse, he recalls his life from that caring start to being Head Gardener - a life story of two loves - for the garden he tends and will eventually manage but also, and more importantly, the unfolding story of his warm, mutually respectful and loyal relationship with the lady of the house; a bond both profound yet understated.

It is a tale of a bygone era, gently dismissive of modern ways, of an ordinary man who is actually quite remarkable and deserving of his employer's respect and collaboration. We are transported to a time long gone of a simpler life, lived in a calmer world.

Giles Shelton's highly skilled performance is perfectly timed, full of humorous anecdotes and not for one moment are we



bored listening to him chattering on! A tour de force, expertly and beautifully told, at times funny yet at others full of pathos and bringing us to tears.

I am so glad that I was able to experience this delightful play. It is on tour and highly recommended.



A traffic impact assessment is in the process of being produced to

assess the overall impact of the development on the village and will be shared with the Parish Council and the village.

Landscaped parking will be providing to discourage offsite parking.

A pre-application will be done for the houses along Abingdon Road, along with community consultation and a housing survey to establish what is needed in the village.

Agriculture makes up 85% of the overall site, with the rest of the proposal being community park and village green at 12%, residential 2%, commercial 0.5% and tourism 0.5%. The commercial aspect is very much a minority percentage, we will be retaining the agricultural function of the farm and making it viable for years to come.

The English Music Festival is Back

Imagine, if you will, a tranquil English village perhaps in Oxfordshire. A river meanders gently through on route to the sea. The largest structure in the village is the ancient abbey church; there are pubs, a delightful cafe, a convenience shop and plenty of local walks to explore. Above our heads, the Red Kites soar and call. Now, add to this mix, a music festival so right and appropriate to the location that you have the ingredients for a perfect late spring weekend. Fortunately, readers of the *Dorchester News* don't have to imagine this as you already live here.

That festival is the English Music Festival (EMF) and it is back in Dorchester-on-Thames from Friday 27 to Sunday 29 May 2022. After an enforced two-year absence, the Fifteenth EMF returns to the magnificent Abbey Church, the Silk Hall at Radley College and the historic All Saints' Church at nearby Sutton Courtenay; and it is better than ever. Festival Director, Em Marshall-Luck has curated a varied programme featuring the works of more than thirty British composers, three orchestras, three choirs and some world-class soloists. This year the events take place as usual on the final weekend in May to avoid clashing with celebrations for HM the Queen's Platinum Jubilee over the (moved) bank holiday weekend.

And what a splendid weekend it promises to be; fascinating music in beautiful surroundings, an opportunity to catch up with old friends, some of whom we have not seen during the past two pandemic-dominated years and, between events, time to soak up the local atmosphere.

On Friday 27 May, conductor Martin Yates directs the BBC Concert Orchestra in the first performance of a new edition of Samuel Coleridge-Taylor's Violin Concerto in G minor. Sometimes referred to as the 'African Mahler', Coleridge-Taylor was the London -born mixed-race composer of the Song Hiawatha and arranger of the African American spiritual, Deep River. First performed 110 years ago, the Concerto was Coleridge-Taylor's

final composition, and

full of gorgeous melodies and soaring beauty.

The BBC Concert Orchestra will also give the World Premiere Performance of Sir Edward Elgar's *The Spanish Lady:* Comedy Overture and the First Professional Performance of the *Petite Suite pour Orchestre* by Frederick Delius. Reginald Morris may not be a familiar name, but R. O. Morris (as he

was known professionally and to his friends) was not only a composer but also a celebrated teacher who counted such notable composers as Gerald Finzi, Michael Tippett, Constant Lambert and Ruth Gipps among his students. His exquisite setting of Cristina Rosetta's Love Came Down at Christmas is probably the only work of his to be regularly performed so a rare opportunity to hear his Sinfonia in C should not be missed. Members of the Thame Chamber Choir and The City of Oxford Choir will join the orchestra in a rousing finale, in the form of Vaughan Williams's Old King Cole.

On Saturday morning, winner of the Kathleen Ferrier Award, tenor Gareth Brynmor John performs a varied programme of English song accompanied by pianist Christopher Glynn. Works by such familiar names as Elgar and Vaughan Williams are featured as are lesser-known works by Havergal Brian, Granville Bantock and Harold Truscott (described by *The Independent* newspaper as 'one of Britain's most outstanding and least adequately celebrated composers'). The duo performed to an enthusiastic audience at last year's Autumn EMF in Horsham, so Dorchester is in for a real Saturday morning treat.

On Saturday afternoon, the EMF pays tribute to Her Majesty the Queen with a programme entitled *A Garland for the Queen* at All Saints' Church in Sutton Courtenay. The Elysian Singers are one of the UK's leading chamber choirs, and they will be

travelling up from London for a varied programme of works by no fewer than 17 British composers including such luminaries as Vaughan Williams, Tippett, Holst and Finzi together with lessfamiliar names such Rawsthorne, Milford and Armstrong-Gibbs. I am also hoping that another EMF tradition will be maintained in the form of the wonderful interval tea that the All Saints' volunteers prepare for the audience. Great music and delicious cake. Who could ask for more?

In fact, there is a lot more and, for many, the highlight of the Festival will be the very welcome return of the nation's favourite baritone, Roderick Williams OBE.

Williams is one of this country's most sought-after artists and is constantly in demand on the concert platform and in recital, encompassing a repertoire from the baroque to World Premieres. At the EMF he will perform Vaughan Williams's luscious *Willow Wood* in a programme that also includes music by Finzi, Ireland, Howells, Delius and Holst, with the Holst Orchestra and the Godwine Choir under the baton of another Festival favourite, Hilary Davan Wetton. So, if you weren't able to catch Williams's performances at the Proms or Covent Garden, with the English National Opera or any of the world's great orchestras, be sure to be at the Abbey Church on Saturday for a very special concert.

But it's not time for bed yet! The EMF's traditional late Saturday night recital will feature guitarist Michael Poll in a programme of works ancient and modern featuring compositions by John Downland, Benjamin Britten and William Walton. Another well-travelled artist, Poll has performed

across Europe, North and South America. The Gramophone magazine described his debut recording, 7-string Bach as 'masterful' and the Abbey Church will provide a beautiful acoustic for his recital.

On Sunday morning we head to the Silk Hall in the immaculate grounds of Radley College where violinist Rupert Marshall-Luck and pianist Nathan Williamson will be performing three exquisite and much-loved works by Sir Edward Elgar -Salut d'Amour, Chanson de Matin and Chanson de Nuit - as giving well as rare performances of Robin

Milford's Sonata in D major and Cecil Armstrong Gibbs's *Lyric Sonata*. Excitingly, the programme concludes with the World Premiere Performance of the magnificent Violin Sonata in D major by Ivor Gurney.


The EMF Lunch, held in The New Pavilion at Radley, is always a convivial and high-spirited occasion. Overlooking the school's extensive playing fields, there may even be an opportunity to watch some cricket before returning to the Silk Hall for the afternoon's concert given by the Addison Singers who, under the direction of David Wordsworth, present a diverse programme of pieces from Arthur Bliss to Ralph Vaughan Williams.

We will be back at Dorchester Abbey on Sunday evening for the final orchestral concert and a rare performance of Holst's glorious *The Cloud Messenger*. If you are only familiar with the composer's legendary suite, *The Planets*, let the Indianinspired *The Cloud Messenger* take you on a magical journey in the company of the English Chamber Orchestra, the Choir of King's College, London and conductor Joseph Fort. The programme will also include Holst's Five Part Songs, Vaughan Williams's *Five Mystical Songs* and Hubert Parry's *Blest Pair of Sirens*.

The Fifteenth English Music Festival concludes on the lighter side with songs by Noël Coward performed by Michael Law in the late-night slot. Michael Law, founder of the world-famous Piccadilly Dance Orchestra, is a highly-acclaimed singer and pianist, with a special affinity for the superb comic and sentimental songs of Coward. Describing his show, the London Evening Standard raved:)'Noel Coward's) songs were all flawlessly performed by singer-pianist Michael Law'. It promises to be a fitting conclusion to a superb weekend of music.





Hearing just a small part of their story gave me goosebumps. We did our best to help. Also, today, we were visited by an alert three-year old with a precocious reading ability. He is a regular customer and is always good for a chat about what's happening in the world. 'Toodle-ooh' he says as he leaves, often offering up a merry wave. What a wonderful turn-of-phrase that is. We should use it more often - perhaps say it to Carol as we leave the Co-op. I might try it!

Soooo, books. What's new? It's only a short selection this month, I'm afraid, because I'm in the middle of a blitz of big family birthdays. Back to normal next month.



Lean. Fall. Stand. by Jon McGregor (fiction pb, £8.99) is a book of three parts. Opening in Antartica, the book finds the lead character, Doc, battling a polar storm. Having lost contact with his fellow team members, Doc is desperately trying to reconnect. The writing is noisy and frantic. Doc is disoriented - something isn't right inside his head. Stylistically, the words and punctuation reflect this cognitive fragmentation – it's the onset of stroke. Then, all is quiet. Doc wakes to find


himself in a sterile, still, hospital. He's suffering from aphasia, meaning he struggles with language – with finding, or saying, the right words. Together, Doc and his wife must learn to find a new way to communicate, and to slowly tread the long path to recovery. The story belongs to both partners – their feelings about the situation in which they unexpectedly find themselves, and their feelings about the new roles they have been forced to take on – carer and cared-for. Not an easy read, but immensely rewarding.

In non-fiction, two books have recently caught my eye. The


first, A History of the Universe in 100 Stars by Florian Freistetter (pb, £9.99) is one of those books that is written so well that it can be enjoyed by anyone, not just science/physics fans. Each short chapter describes a different star and is liberally sprinkled with snippets of fascinating facts. For instance, 'The Pole Star isn't the brightest star in the sky, even if people keep saying it is. In the list of the brightest stars, it comes a paltry 47th.' Apparently, the reason we think the Pole Start is bright is to



do with the fact that the Earth 'wobbles'. Want to know how the star got its name? This book will tell you.

The second non-fiction book that elicited an 'oooh' as it came out of the box was *The Secret World of Weather* by Tristan

Dooley (pb, £10.99). The book's subtitle sums up the content perfectly: 'How to Read Signs in Every Cloud, Breeze, Hill, Street, Plant, Animal and Dewdrop'. That sentence pretty much does my job for me. For good measure, I'll add that the science is well explained, often with the aid of illustrations, and the personal anecdotes, amuse. It's a book about weather, and we live in England. Enough said.

The county council's website www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ ukrainesupport is being used as the central host for this information. Sponsor information has been published on this site along with local information for Ukrainian guests. South and Vale's website will signpost people to these pages.

The county council's customer services team has started to make first contact phone calls to hosts and letters will begin to be distributed as part of this process outlining next steps for hosts and guests. In partnership, councils (including us) have begun initiating the accommodation and safeguarding checks required.

Berinsfield Grants Scheme launched on Wednesday 6 April.

A special grant scheme as part of the Garden Village project is now ready to go. There are substantial sums available, and all proposed projects/services/activities must take place directly in Berinsfield and be able to demonstrate direct benefits to meet a clearly identified need for Berinsfield residents. The team will be on hand to support local groups in applying and getting through the process.

We will encourage organisations who are actively exploring partnership/joint working with other voluntary organisations, businesses or the public sector and who want to invest in becoming more sustainable, plus those organisations having a greater impact in Berinsfield. The council recognises the value of local community organisations delivering projects and key services to our residents and their need for grants that extend for more than a one-year period. County Council calls for government review of adult social care funding

OCC called on the government to review its funding allocations for adult social care, following publication of a review into the cost of care by the County Councils Network. The report estimates that, nationally, an extra £854 million is needed in the allocation fund each year to make care sustainable and avoid large-scale closures and ensure ongoing investment into the social care sector.

County Council to pursue detailed discussions on stadium proposal

Oxford United FC's bid to lease 18 hectares at Stratfield Brake in Kidlington for 250 years to develop a new 18,000 capacity football stadium is set to be discussed, based on objectives that have been guided by extensive public feedback. In January the council conducted a public engagement exercise on the stadium proposal, and a total of 3,740 responses were received. Cabinet has agreed that the council should enter discussions while seeking maximum environmental, transport and education benefits.

Oxfordshire's £32.8m Zero Emission Bus Regional Areas (ZEBRA) bid to the Department for Transport (DfT) was successful. Along with £6m from the council and £43.7m from bus companies Go Ahead and Stagecoach, the funding will deliver 159 electric buses and the infrastructure to charge them in a package worth £82.5m.

The electric buses will be rolled out starting from summer 2023 and will be used on bus routes operating wholly within the Oxford Smart Zone. They will save an estimated 9,200 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions each year – the equivalent of taking more than 6,000 cars off the road – and will mean that approximately 70% of bus miles driven in the Smart Zone area will be operated by electric buses.

This is **in addition** to the £12.7m secured (out of the £56 million originally requested) as part of the National Bus Strategy fund - 31 areas across England were awarded money under the latest round of the Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) scheme. Many areas received nothing at all.

Separately, Oxfordshire County Council has received £500,000 to support Oxford to become a zero emission transport city, as part of a government pilot programme. The Department for Transport invited cities who are keen to

decarbonise their transportation systems and make zero emission travel more accessible to apply for funding. Oxfordshire County Council is one of just three local authorities to receive this funding, selected because of our commitment to deliver extensive bike lanes, an all-electric bus fleet, restrictions that discourage petrol and diesel vehicles, and initiatives that increase the use of electric cargo bikes (ecargo) and vans for deliveries.


Of immediate local interest, I have received confirmation from cabinet member Tim Bearder that the routing of the X39/X40 service remains under review, and there is optimism that the 3rd hourly service may return in September.

HIF1 Didcot/Culham/Clifton Hampden bypass project

After representations from local councillors, OCC cabinet have delayed their final decision on the HIF1 project, requesting assurances from government before final approval. The project budget has increased to £296million from the original planned £235m, meaning the council now has to borrow to fund some of the costs. The council has asked for-

- An extension to 31 March 2026 and assurance that risks to the delivery timeframe caused by exceptional circumstances will be mitigated.
- Confirmation that the Council has flexibility to design and deliver infrastructure that will reduce the carbon impact and reduce the need to travel by car.
- The draft of any amended GDA (Grant Determination Agreement) to be presented to OCC Cabinet for approval.
- A Cabinet Advisory Group (CAG) to be set up to oversee the detailed design and development of HIF1, consistent with OCC's new strategic priorities.
- Development of a new Didcot area transport strategy and masterplan

Wallingford Museum News

Wallingford Museum is experimenting in new forms of interpretation, namely podcasts and YouTube films.

Our first YouTube film is of Judy Dewey, Curator of Wallingford Museum, describing how the castle model fits within the present day town.



The Museum's latest acquisition, GD Leslie's painting *A Thameside Conversation* is the subject of an Anthony Wilder podcast. If you listen to the podcast at home we hope you will be inspired to come to the museum to see this superb painting for yourself.

GD Leslie (1835-1921) was a well known Victorian artist who lived in Wallingford at Riverside in Thames Street between 1884 and 1891. He was an ardent lover of nature and particularly of the River Thames and this painting depicts a scene on the riverside, probably at Pangbourne. It was exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1864.

The good news is that Wallingford's Guided Historic Town Walks have started again, every Saturday morning at 11.00am from 16 April until 24 September. There is no advance booking, so just meet the guide under the Town Hall in Wallingford Market Place at 11.00am any Saturday. The round tour takes approximately an hour and a half.

The cost is £10 per person (cash only please) which includes an open season ticket to Wallingford Museum for 2022. All walk proceeds help to support this splendid volunteer-run museum.

Each walk is led by an expert guide from The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society, exploring the backstreets and bringing to life the history of the town and



its buildings from Saxon times to the present day.
