New Rector for Dorchester Abbey

We are delighted to announce the appointment of the Revd Jane Willis as our new Team Rector (subject to formalities). Jane will be licensed on Monday 13 February 2023, at 7.30 p.m. at Dorchester Abbey. Jane has written this to introduce herself to us all:

'Greetings to everyone in the Dorchester Team! It was great to meet some of you on the interview day and I'm really looking forward to serving as your new Team Rector. Nothing quite beats meeting face to face, but for now a few words of introduction...

I'm presently Rector of Holy Trinity Church, Hurstpierpoint – a large Sussex village just beneath the South Downs and north of Brighton. I've served here for eight years during which time the church has experienced new life and growth – as well as navigating covid times. Having felt the time had now come to move on, I'm delighted to have a deep sense of call to serve the Dorchester Team.

I'm married to Gerry and we have three adult daughters, four grandchildren – and we're presently 'between dogs'. I was born in Canada, spent my childhood in Hampshire, teenage years in Cheshire and moved to Sussex when I was 17. That was where I came to faith, met and married Gerry, had babies – and where my call to ordination began. Since then we've been on God's great tour of England – moving first to Northampton to a full time lay ministry post in a town centre church, then to Oxford for two years ordination training (we love Oxford!), curacy at

Shrewsbury Abbey, first incumbency with a group of rural churches in North Devon along with being chaplain to the children's hospice, before being called back to Sussex. Gerry runs his own property maintenance business, which he's restarted every time we've moved! He is also a Reader (LLM/Licensed Lay Minister in Oxford terms).

In our free time we enjoy walking, exploring new places and landscapes – and I'm a keen photographer. Family time is also precious to us – a real bonus for us is that in Dorchester we will be nearer to them all.

I have a feeling the next few months will fly by and we will soon be with you – in the mean time we will be praying for you, and would really value your prayers for good endings here and good beginnings with you all.




Results of the 2022 Ride and Stride for Dorchester Abbey

Robin Oakley at The Village Hall

On Friday 11 November Dorchester resident, Robin Oakley regaled an audience of about 60 people in the Village Hall with stories from his years as a political journalist. After considering, and rejecting, careers as a war correspondent or an international affairs journalist, Robin started his career at the Liverpool Daily Post where he became Political Editor. From there he moved to London to work for the Sunday Express, The Daily Mail, The Spectator and The Times amongst others, before becoming Political Editor of the BBC, where he became a familiar face to us all on our television screens between 1992 and 2000.

Throughout his career it was his job to know politicians, and here he treated us to some of the stories of what some who he knew got up to and how they operated. Robin talked about how things changed over his career, with the rise of the spin doctor influencing the increasing priority given to image over substance. Of the prime ministers he knew, John Major was clearly his favourite, but Robin could still not resist telling us how the prime minister became known for having his shirt tucked into his underpants.

Robin's talk was followed by questions to which his answers were so enthralling it was difficult for the host of the evening, Geoff Russell, to bring proceedings to a close.

Trustee vacancy

The Hurst Water Meadow Trust is seeking a new trustee to help manage some of the village's much-loved green spaces. The trustees, who are responsible for the Hurst Meadow, Old Bridge Meadow and Overy Mead Piece, formally meet twice a year, with additional ad hoc meetings of all or some of us when needed. The job is to deliver on our three objectives of conservation and protection of the meadows; advancing public education; and providing a safe place for the public's enjoyment.

The Trust is now a charitable incorporated organisation. That means we are no longer just a bunch of people with personal liability if things go seriously wrong. Being 'incorporated' means there is a body between us and the world which has the liability which formerly fell directly onto the trustees. Of course, we have no intention of allowing things to go seriously wrong, but incorporation is a nice to have protective feature for trustees just in case.

Another consequence of incorporation is that our trustees now have three year rather than undated terms of office. They can be reselected, but the expectation is that we will be regularly infused with fresh talent, new perspectives and energy.

The upshot is that we have two trustee vacancies at the end of

this year. Mike Southon is retiring after over twenty years as a trustee, including a spell as our Hon. Secretary. More recently he has looked after our relationship with the Rural Payments Agency who administer our agricultural grants - ask any farmer how easy that is and you will appreciate contribution. Louise Aukland is our other retiree, who in mid summer decided she had to give priority to her professional career and family. She oversaw our objective to advance public education and understanding of the ecology of the meadow. St Birinus School in particular has benefitted from that.

Our two new trustees need not be clones of Mike and Louise. In fact we have already found one new trustee in Louise Beland, who has made an outstanding contribution this year in managing our weekly volunteer team. But it would be very helpful to have someone to replace Louise Aukland who has educational exposure.

So what can you expect to do as a trustee? Of course there is the usual routine administration of running a small charity. But the important part of the job is to deliver through practical action our

three objectives of conservation, public education and public enjoyment, and resolve the tensions which arise between them. For example, how radical should we be in restoring the hedge running across the centre of the Hurst meadow, which has become a riot of brambles and scrub? And at the eastern end of this hedge one of our finest ash trees is suffering from what appears to be serious ash die back disease, such that safety considerations may require considerable tree surgery. Ecologically many professionals advocate leaving things as they are and letting nature do its own thing. Recreationally, many would find the hedge uncovered from bramble and laid in the traditional manner to be more attractive, and the ash tree is magnificent even in its early stage of decay. But how safe is the footpath near to large boughs that may become brittle as a result of disease? Tree surgery becomes dramatically more difficult and expensive when decay takes hold.

If you appreciate the meadows, and would like to participate in resolving questions like this, do please consider applying to be a trustee. 



From the Chairman of the Parish Council



Change in Dorchester, like any other community, is complicated. Bishops Court Farm dominates the footprint of the village, with roughly half the land, so change there is always going to be particularly complicated.

It is fair to say that a number of residents on all sides ask us, as parish councillors, what our collective view is. Unfortunately, or perhaps inevitably, the views on the Parish Council reflect the diversity of views on both the wider plans and specific elements of them and it's fair to say we have lively debates! So, what is our role as a Parish Council in these circumstances? Well, we see our role as two fold; firstly to ensure transparency, working with Keith Ives and his team to ensure information is clear and public; secondly to give a voice to those who have strong views whilst recognising the diversity of views. This is not always easy as inevitably both sides of a debate pull at us and want us to come down firmly on one side or the other. So I'm pleased to report that this month we had a very long and productive conversation at the Parish Council with the architects working for Keith and whilst there were disagreements, of course, we felt it was a helpful session to lay out the various intertwined issues and opinions. As well as the sessions Keith runs at the farm to keep the village up to date, residents are always welcome to come to the Parish Council meeting to join the debate whatever their views.

I often update you on other progress with our local environment. This month is particularly noteworthy in this regard as, due to the hard work of a number of residents, especially Becky Waller who set the ball rolling back in 2016, the Village Green status of the Dyke Hills and the field besides Days Lock have been confirmed. The Parish Council could not be more pleased; as should all residents be. This status guarantees the access to those plots of land in perpetuity, a wonderful legacy for future residents. Thanks to all those involved.

Looking forward, councillors have been asked what practical steps we are taking to address the climate emergency. Clearly many of these issues affecting us are in the hands of central government, OCC and SODC and Robin Bennett and others will cover those in their updates to residents.

But as a village we can still try to do our bit. To that end we are in discussion with OCC about EV charging points to support the increasing use of electric vehicles and particularly for those who don't have off street parking. This discussion is in its early days but I want to let you know that we have set the ball rolling. If residents have other ideas that we can look at then please let me or other councillors know and we'll see what we can do.

I hope some of you who have children or grandchildren or indeed those who don't, were able to join Rob Ballantyne's presentation in the While Hart, on how we might update the playground. These things are fiendishly expensive and we are dependent on grants to make meaningful progress.

The next few months will tell us if we are successful, but in the meantime it is great to have had the input of older villagers to go with the excellent ideas from the school children. Time will tell if we can do what we want to do.

There are around eight orientation boards around the village to help visitors find their way. But they are a few years old and look both tired and are factually out of date so we plan to update them before the spring. This will cost us around £1,500, so if there is any local business that would like to sponsor these boards, in whole or part, in return for some appropriate branding on them then let the Parish Clerk, Geoff Russell, know and we'll see if we can agree on something.

Finally, the Coronation might feel some way off, but time will rush up on us. We would like to use this national event as an opportunity to come together as a community. That needs people and energy. So if you are willing and able to do your bit please do step forward and let me or other councillors know. The Parish Council will provide the funding for bunting, and other bits and pieces but its people that bring it to life.

Nearly £6.5 million awarded to help local businesses

More than 2,000 businesses have received a much-needed relief award totalling almost £6.5 million to help reduce their business rates thanks to South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils.

In total, £6,471,842 was allocated to businesses, using the government's Covid-19 Additional Relief Fund, to help organisations that were unable to receive previous government Covid-19 grants despite having been badly affected by the pandemic.

South Oxfordshire calls Government's investment zone initiative 'disaster in making'

Councillors in South Oxfordshire made it clear they wouldn't be happy to see the government's so-called 'investment zones' in the district, and welcomed the county council's decision not to bid for any in Oxfordshire.

As part of the recent disastrous mini-budget, the government announced plans that would seek to relax planning rules around development and 'remove burdensome EU requirements'. However, South Oxfordshire councillors resoundingly backed a motion I put forward in October, robustly objecting to this proposal. At the time of writing, it seems the new chancellor is about to scrap these 'investment zones', which would have bypassed local democratic control.

The International Tree Foundation and Oxfordshire Trees Collaborate are working together this autumn to offer free tree saplings for people to plant in their garden in a scheme supported by SODC. Council passes new Active Communities strategy

This strategy, agreed last month, is a brand new approach to health and wellbeing developed to help residents come together to take part in sport, health and recreational activities that improve their physical and mental wellbeing, while forging stronger social links within their local communities.

Through coaching, communication, and engagement, and providing advice and access to external sources of funding, the council will work in partnership with community groups, local schools, sports clubs, children's centres, and leisure providers to significantly expand what activities are available to all parts of the community across the District.

The council also aims to encourage sustainable active transport methods like walking and cycling, and to make maximum use of green spaces and the districts' waterways as

it's widely recognised that spending time in the natural environment is beneficial for mental health and wellbeing.

Funds awarded to Berinsfield charities as part of the 'Garden Village' regeneration project.

SODC have allocated £345,000 to help put on community events, to help buy new laptops, projectors, kitchen equipment, towards running costs and to help improve gardens and open spaces in Berinsfield. The money came from a special grant scheme just for Berinsfield that organisations and groups applied to earlier this year. The money will help them to continue to run events and vital services serving Berinsfield and our wider area. After a thorough and independent process, funds have been awarded to Berinsfield Adult Day Care Centre, Berinsfield Community Association, Berinsfield Parish Council, Early Years Pre-School, BIVC, Berin Centre, Oxfordshire Play Association, ARCh, Riverside Counselling Services, and the Berry Youth Centre

Study looking at community facilities

Oxford Architects will be meeting with people from the charities, organisations and groups that use or own buildings and spaces in Berinsfield to find out how they use them now and what more they think they'll need in the future. The new findings will help us to look at how new or renovated community buildings and spaces could be designed so that charities, organisations and groups in the village can continue to offer services that residents want and need in the future. A successful summer at Riverside Park, Wallingford

This year the Riverside Park outdoor pool and campsite in Wallingford had a bumper summer season with nearly 21,000 visitors. On its busiest week, the pool had nearly 4,500 visitors, the highest number in over 20 years for a single week.

The pool and campsite opened for the season this year from late May through to early September and this season South Oxfordshire District Council in partnership with GLL, who manage the site and Better UK facilities for the council, introduced some new activities and initiatives for those using the pool and campsite. These included aqua aerobics classes, Swim Dr swimming lessons, the ability to book the campsite via the Better UK app and dogs were also allowed on to the campsite resulting in an increase in bookings.

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Household Support Fund update

OCC have used the government funded Household Support Fund to support locally based emergency welfare schemes, delivered in partnership with our district and city council partners.

Over the next two to three weeks, OCC are sending a one-off payment of £85 to 11,000 households to support energy costs this winter. This will go to households which include a pensioner in receipt of council tax reduction. Eligible residents will receive an Oxfordshire-branded letter from the Post Office with a bar code, redeemable for cash at all Post Office branches. Residents can ask a relative or friend to redeem the voucher on their behalf. We have chosen this low-administrative cost approach over alternative online options, with the intention being that residents who have not been able to access other schemes will be able to use this approach.

Ahead of the recent half term, we funded schools and colleges to provide children and young people entitled to free school meals with a £15 voucher to support with the costs of food. Equivalent support for early years children will be provided later in the term. Funding for this scheme is provided through a time-limited government grant, which is scheduled to come to an end in March 2023.

Energy support scheme

We are currently making arrangements to announce a community building energy support scheme. The fund is designed to provide grants to community and voluntary organisations to help with the cost of their rising energy bills, so they do not pass on additional costs to users of those venues. The scheme will be delivered through Oxfordshire Community Foundation.

Updated parking standards for new developments approved

Earlier this month our cabinet approved an updated guide for parking standards for new developments. It means developers will need to work collaboratively with us to help achieve the targets set in the Local Transport and Connectivity Plan (LTCP), which was adopted earlier this year. The LTCP aims to create a net zero transport system in Oxfordshire by 2040, improving health and wellbeing, tackling the climate emergency, reducing private vehicle use, and prioritising walking, cycling and public transport.

Hyperlocal care options continue to grow thanks to Oxfordshire business support

People in Oxfordshire who receive adult social care support at home are now able to choose from a wider range of services thanks to the success of a free scheme that helps people to set up their own care micro-enterprise. Social enterprise group Community Catalysts is being funded by us and offers mentoring advice alongside practical business support, helping people to work for themselves by offering care and support in their local area.

Homes for Ukraine update

As a direct response to feedback from hosts, we have committed to increasing the total amount they receive each month from £350 to £550. We will be funding this using the government's £10,500 support payment it is providing us with per guest.

This payment increase will be from November 2022 until March 2023 and will be payable in arrears from the 1 December 2022. It will be paid into bank accounts as a separate payment and will only apply when people host for more than half a full month. The increase will not be subject to tax and will not affect entitlement to any benefits.

This acknowledges and goes some way to address the increase in costs that existing hosts are facing. This increase will also apply to new hosts joining the scheme. For those who have indicated that they want to stop hosting after the sixmonth mark, we are also getting back in touch with them to let them know about the payment increase in case that helps retain more hosts on the scheme.

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Having been through a rather turbulent period I am pleased that we now have Rishi Sunak as our Prime Minister. He has had my support over the months, and I believe that he will be the person to get to grips with the key issues that we face.

It is interesting to reflect on the issues that have been before us in recent months and also the reactions that come forward in the media and indeed in the many emails that I receive. Understandably there are strongly held views and in this time of Remembrance it seems to me that there is plenty of room for shared understanding, moderation and mutual tolerance.

Take for example the attendance of the Prime Minister at COP27. Within a few days of taking office, at a time when there are huge national issues to address, his initial response was that he could not attend due to needing instead to focus on the immediate issues before him. He faced a backlash on that and, once he had been able to assess the workload on his desk, agreed that he could go. However rather than this being seen as a decision based on assessment of the situation it was dubbed as a U turn. If politicians 'stick to their guns' they may be accused of not listening. If they give serious thought to an issue and have a change of heart they are accused of a U turn. Either way there is an accusation to face

It is good that the Prime Minister has pledged to return to the 2019 manifesto which was supported through the General Election. It promised an ambitious environmental programme with robust action on climate change and nature loss. It is important to note that protecting our environment does not mean sacrificing economic growth. Green measures can reduce the cost of living, create employment, investment and export opportunities, and safeguard our long-term prosperity and security. It is also important to ensure that measures taken are affordable and encourage people to make environmentally friendly decisions. It is precisely this need to bring people with us that protest groups overlook. It is not about who shouts loudest or makes the grandest gestures but about how we work together to resolve the important issues of our time.

Let us also consider the issue of storm discharges where untreated sewage is released into rivers. I completely agree that sewage pollution is not acceptable but when these

discharges of untreated sewage are released into a river it is when water levels exceptionally high and there is risk of flooding to properties. If you live in a property which, as things stand, would be flooded with raw sewage if these discharges were not made this might have a strong influence on your view and the realistic timescales for improvement.

In seeking to work together we need to get beyond the headlines. There will always be differing views on important issues and often some conflicting approaches to similar ends. There is rarely, if ever, a perfect answer. It is good to discuss issues, and sometimes discussion may be heated, but when disagreement turns to abuse and protest causes genuine difficulty to others we have lost our democratic compass.




