'We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the ground...' we sing lustily at every Harvest Festival. Though to be honest, for the most part, we don't. When our children were little we had some good friends, Jonathan and Alex. Jonathan had always wanted to be a farmer, but had somehow ended up an insurance broker. So, to make up for the lack, they had three allotments. They were a bit of an inspiration to me. One day the nearest I would ever get to the image of an earth-mother, I made bread with our girls (this was in the days before bread-makers!) - and felt rather pleased with myself. Later that day I told Alex at the school gate- she smiled and said 'Ah yes, we're growing wheat on our allotment.' It was clear I was never going to keep up...

For most of us the nearest we get to food production is a vegetable patch – we've been rescuing at least part of the vegetable patch in the Rectory garden and are also enjoying having a greenhouse for first time. But with fresh

the first time. But with fresh produce readily available in our supermarkets, now apparently independent of season or the elements, we generally find ourselves somewhat removed from its source – and hence to any sense of dependence on God for all that he gives us. Some years ago I was ministering in a number of deeply rural North Devon communities. One of my congregations was made up entirely of farmers and their families, two of my churches were in farmyards. Suddenly all the metaphors of harvest that had featured in my preaching in previous years were these people's real lives - and I was very much a lay person. I will never forget passing the peace shaking farmers' strong hands, or placing the communion bread in hands rough and stained from farm work. These people's relationship with land and place was like nothing I had ever known – and yes, farmers are always talking about the weather: asking me to pray for rain, or for it to stop raining (in North Devon it was usually the latter!). Here these people's livelihoods were deeply

K&K Link News

From **11 to 14 October**, members of the Diocese of Kimberley & Kuruman and Diocese of Oxford are invited to join our 2nd link Summit, coming together in shared prayer, study, learning and conversation.

The theme is 'Encourage one another and build each other up' (1 Thess. 5:11), which is also the Diocese of Kimberley and Kuruman's theme for 2023. Encouragement and mutual support are part of our calling as members of the Body of Christ - whether we are together or far apart, we can help each other to serve Christ faithfully.

Our 2017 summit was held face-to-face only: this time we will have a hybrid meeting, with some people meeting face-to-face and others meeting online.

The opening and closing worship, daily Bible studies, evening prayer, and keynote addresses will be live streamed for anyone in both dioceses to attend.

In addition, UK link parishes will meet in Thame on the 11th, where an online hub will connect them with Kimberley to share in the opening worship and presentations. Link parishes on both sides will also have opportunities to share with each other in Bible study and in other discussions throughout the summit.

Youth hubs, for young people between the ages of 18 and 25, will be formed on both sides and will share in online discussions on the 13th and 14th.

We encourage *anyone* in the Dorchester team to join in! If you'd like to attend the in-person meeting in Thame (11 October), where you can meet up with other parishes who also have links in the K&K Diocese, please RSVP to Amy Herlihy (see below) as we need a head count for catering.

What are the topics that will be discussed at the Summit? We will be hearing about each other's contexts through presentations and conversations; sharing daily Bible studies, evening prayer, and two eucharists; learning about key missional areas such as tackling gender-based violence and working for climate justice; and reflecting on how we can faithfully serve Christ in our own contexts and as partners in the Gospel.

We will soon have an Eventbrite page to register your interest for attending the sessions.

Do we really need a food bank?

By July this year the food bank had already fed 18% more households than in the whole of 2021/22.

Recent statistics show that the average increase in fuel prices over the 12 months to June is: gas 36.2% and electricity 17.3%. In addition, the cost of many basic store cupboard foods has increased by more than 20%. As there was an increase in benefits of only 10% in April, this means that many people are living on much less money than they were this time last year.

The foods which are most needed – these are the most expensive to buy in the shops - are: pasta products and couscous; low fat milk; jams, marmalades and honey; fruit and vegetable juices; tea and coffee; sugar and fruit. Toiletries and items for babies are necessary too.

Any donation however small will be very welcome.

Hempcroft Allotments October

The Allotment Society AGM for 2023 was held in the Village Hall on Thursday 21 September at 7.30pm. This was an opportunity to pay your rent for the forthcoming year which starts on 1 October, collect seed catalogues, and meet some fellow allotment neighbours. There are no rent increase for the forthcoming year.

The harvesting should be coming to an end in September/ October. Root crops should be lifted while they are still growing in dry soil. Lift potatoes before they become trapped in cold wet soil later in the month. It is important to dry their skins before putting into storage. October is the month when the preparations for the 2024 growing season begin in earnest. As the ground is cleared of crops collect up all weeds and leaves. Next year's runner bean trench can be opened up and the vegetable trimmings from the crops can be thrown in to start breaking down over the winter. Add annual weeds etc to form a spongy water holding reservoir to help the beans survive hot days (hopefully) next summer.



Dorchester Abbey Museum News

Exciting new Acquisition

The museum has just acquired a silver bodkin, found in a field in Dorchester in 2019 by a detectorist, passed to the Portable Antiquities Scheme, and then assessed at the British Museum. The bodkin is thought to be possibly from the period 1500-1700, weighs 10.83g and measures 70mmx30mm. It has the inscription SW on one side and a maker's mark 'D S' within a flower on the other, a five-pointed star above and a pellet below. We can only speculate about its possible owner, and how it came to be in the middle of a field! It will be on display in the museum before the winter closure.



Database progress

We now have MODES software, a widely used system for museum collections management. The MODES database update and editing is progressing well, thanks to Candy Madeley's excellent work in training us to use the system. A collection of old postcards of Dorchester which belonged to the late Muriel (Jane) Hill, and kindly donated by her daughter Paula Elias, has been documented on the database by Megan Parry and Denise Line, each with a description and photograph. We plan to keep adding new items as well as editing the older records on the database.





'I am a Dorchester girl'

Margaret Mary Atkins was born in what is now 14 Queen Street Dorchester in November 1933. Named after her two Grannies, she was surely a welcome addition to the Atkins family. Her brothers George, Tom and Denis were 19, 17 and 11 respectively. Their parents, George, a jobbing gardener, village barber and amateur chiropodist, and Edith, a domestic cleaner, were strict, but doted on Margaret and she had a happy childhood and worked hard at her lessons. After primary and senior school in Dorchester, she had office jobs until her marriage.

Before marriage, Margaret joined her brother Denis's family for holidays to Devon and Cornwall. Margaret Mary means Pearl of the Sea and she lived up

to her name there – swimming off the rocks and beaches encouraged by Denis. How she loved to swim, keeping up weekly sessions at Berinsfield until her health prevented that.

Margaret and Roger married at the Abbey in 1955. A very happy day. Sixty years later, The Revd Sue Booys generously organised and presided at a Thanksgiving Service for the happy couple. To their delight she wore the new wedding cope for the occasion.

In the 60s and 70s Kevin's and Gena's arrivals truly blessed Margaret and Roger – the family was based, by then,

in Benson. The extended family meant so much to them both. They were always so interested and encouraging to family and friends – it was their real gift for friendship offered to all.

Margaret was a member of the Benson Bowling Team and she and Roger both won many trophies. They played throughout England.

Years on, when her health deteriorated and Margaret needed extra assistance, she was very grateful for all the help offered. Fortunate to have willing and kind family, wonderful neighbours and friends, Margaret (and Roger) struggled to be in control and independent late into their illnesses. But in the final months, when extra care was called for, support came from the ambulance staff, district nurses, GP and surgery staff, paid carers, Sue Ryder nurses, and everybody Waterside at Wallingford. (Roger had predeceased Margaret by a few months.)

During lockdown Margaret was very grateful for the weekly online ministry offered by the clergy from the Abbey. Given her deep Christian faith, she appreciated the pastoral care given by the Revd Stephen Cousins of Ewelme over many months.

Margaret remained 'A Dorchester girl' all her life – the village of her birth was 'home' wherever she lived.

Whilst we have been enjoying the summer your Parish Councillors have been hard at work on your behalf on issues which we know residents care about. So I'd like to start by thanking your councillors for all they are doing at a particularly busy time.

The main event this month is the launch of 'Dorchester 2030 and Beyond', our survey to ask what you think and what your priorities are for Dorchester over the next few years. At the Annual Parish Meeting in June we got some insight from those who were able to attend. But now we want to know what everybody thinks. The survey is now live and you can complete it up to the end of October. You should have a paper copy with this edition of Dorchester News which you can return to the box in the Coop. But we'd much prefer as many individuals as possible to fill it in via the online link. The more people who complete the survey, the better we understand what really matters to our community. So, please take a few minutes to do your bit and help shape our priorities for the next decade. When we have the results in we will, of course, be sharing then with the whole community and also then discussing how we mobilise to deliver some of those priorities.

In the meantime there is progress on a number of other fronts. Firstly I am delighted to say we have now signed the contracts for the improvements to upgrade our recreation ground facilities with the support of a number of grants. Most importantly the changes will give something for a wider range of age groups and abilities. The table tennis table is already installed, some new football goals are arriving around the time you read this and work on the playground upgrade starts shortly. We hope this will encourage more residents to make use of the rec and all it has to offer. Playground installation works will cause a little disruption of course but I'm sure it will be worth it. I want to pay particular tribute to Councillor Becky Waller and ex-Councillor Rob Ballantyne who, along with a bunch of other folk, have got us to this point.

Over the last month I am sure you will have seen a number of initiatives to smarten parts of our village. The Bridge Blitz team was a huge success with over 20 people de-weeding our bridge. Other initiatives have tidied the triangle at the bottom of Abingdon Rd and cleaned the bus shelters on the bypass. Thanks to all those who organised and took part. Adding to the work of the Green DOTs team and the work of the Hurst team this means we are finding ways to improve our local environment without waiting for over-stretched district and county council team to do things for us. The parish council wishes to continue to encourage and support this approach; if you have ideas let us know and we will try and support where required.

We know that bypass noise is an issue many people raise in the village. This has been a long and frustrating road and we aren't there yet. But I can report that Councillor Mike Atkinson is beginning to get some traction with the police who have appointed an officer to work on the issue. So, not yet the result we want, but at least we have found a starting point which is progress after previous frustrations. I can't promise timescales or where precisely we will get to but let's hope that working with other local councils and the police we can, at last, start to get somewhere. Fingers crossed.

The 'What's on in Dorchester' event will be taking place in the Village Hall on Monday 16 October from 6.00-9.00pm. We already have a good array of stall holders but there is always room for more, so, if you run an activity and want new recruits or know an organisation that would like to be represented, then get in touch with Geoff Russell on

New £50,000 fund to increase biodiversity and encourage public access to green spaces

In a new partnership with Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE), the money will be given as grants through TOE's Local Environment Fund to help boost local nature recovery efforts and reduce the impacts of climate change.

Community groups, town and parish councils, charities and non-profit organisations are invited to apply to TOE for funds to help look after South Oxfordshire's green spaces. Grants ranging between £1,000 and £15,000 can be used for tree and hedgerow planting or restoring community orchards, ponds, and nature-rich meadows.

Grants could also be used to improve access to nature for the public to enjoy and learn from. This could include replacing stiles with gates for better accessibility and also improving pathways.

The new fund uses money from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) paid by developer contributions.

Early applications are encouraged, so any South Oxfordshire based group involved in protecting and restoring their local environment should contact TOE to find out more.

Detailed guidance and application forms are on www.trustforoxfordshire.org.uk/local-environment-fund. The first deadline application deadline is 2 October 2023, then 8 January 2024. Submissions close at midday.

Contractor agreed to supply new artificial sports pitch at Abbey Sports Centre

Officers were mindful to ensure the contractors provided a sustainability statement outlining their policies and commitment to specify and procure sustainably sourced, carbon footprint reduced products, provide details around the removal of waste and their services in a way which will also meet our value for money and quality objectives.

Lighting header units will consist of LED lights to further reduce the carbon footprint and running costs of the new installation. Drainage improvements will be incorporated into the already installed soakaway system.






