'Someone once said to me that
November was a difficult month for
her. All the important anniversaries in
her life seemed to be during this
month. The happy and sad memories,
the poignant and with that a sense of
loss. As we get older I am sure that we
all have times of the year when special
memories are sharper.

However, November is also a particular time of the year for remembering within our communities. First at the beginning of the month our church communities remember the lives of the many saints that have been examples of faith throughout the centuries. Next there is the opportunity to remember those more personal to us whom we have lost, especially those who have died recently but not exclusively. Many of our churches hold special services when we can name our loved ones and

light a candle. Then, of course, there is the national remembrance of those who lost their lives serving their country during, not only two world wars, but also in conflicts since.

Our memories are what make us who we are both as individuals and as communities. It is important that we have the opportunities to share these, not only our personal experiences but also national and international events that require us to process the effect these have on all our lives. Hempcroft Allotments November

The Hempcroft Allotment Society Annual General Meeting was held on 21 September 2023 in the Village Hall. About 40 members paid their rent and subscriptions for the coming year and about 30 stayed for the AGM.

Edward Metcalfe continued as the Chairman, Jon Rosby as the Treasurer, and Sharon Thorpe, Charlotte Bennett, Debbie Field and Chris Hill continued as committee members.

The trophy for the Best Kept Allotment was awarded this year to Matthew and Maggie Grayson for the sterling work they have put into their well structured and maintained plot.

Membership of the Society decreased to 81 members from 89 the previous year. We appear to be returning to the precovid membership numbers. The accounts of the Society were presented. These continue to be in a healthy state with £1,790 held in the account or as cash. There has been no need to increase the rent or the subscriptions this year. The rents are gathered on behalf of the Parish Council who pay for the water that is used on the allotments.

Seed catalogues were available for collection at the meeting and members were encouraged to order seeds from the catalogue because the Society derives some income from this. The Kings seed catalogue contains many colour photographs of the vegetables or flowers, which will be a great help in identifying which seeds one might wish to buy.

This is the time of year, i.e. rent collection time, when some people decide to give up their allotment. We now have some good plots available ranging from small squares to half size (5 pole) plots, to full size (10 pole). If anyone is interested then please contact me.


DADS Dorchester Amateur Dronmatics Society

Participation in a research project

We have been contacted by the School of Biosciences, University of Sheffield to invite participation in a research project on the Co-benefits of Urban Horticulture.

They are launching a study across England to investigate the seasonal impact of food growing participation on the diet of allotment growers. This study is following on from the work of the MYHarvest project, and will assess how diet (particularly fruit and vegetable intake) varies by season for food growers, and the impacts on nutrition. This study will help to feed into a larger body of work on the co-benefits (health, wellbeing, social benefits) of urban horticulture, and the potential of urban food growing to be used to improve public health. Participants would be asked to fill out an online food diary for a 72-hours period (three days) every month, for 12-months. This diary would be a list of everything the participant eats and drinks on each of the three days, and would be completed on the software myfood24. Participants would also be asked to fill in a short survey about their allotment and general access to food at the time of each monthly recall. For each fully completed recall period, you will be entered into a prize draw to win a £50 'love-to-shop' gift card.

The data will be used to produce an academic report with the aim of publishing this project in an academic journal. The works or portions of the work may be shared on organisation websites and through social media. Alongside this, the project's research findings will be presented at various conferences and events. If you indicate that you would like one, they will also mail or email you a summary of the research findings.

The contact person is Bethany Leake who is a 2nd year PhD student at the University of Sheffield, supervised by Dr Jill Edmondson. A link to the online registration survey and the advertisement poster has been provided:



Professor Malcolm Airs will talk on: Sir Gilbert Scott in Clifton Hampden, Burcot and Dorchester



OXFORDSHIRE

Warborough & Shillingford WI

The WI September meeting welcomed Mark Stevenson to talk about his organic market garden. Mark is registered with the Soil Association who inspect his farm regularly,

and to be accredited he cannot use chemicals, pesticides, irradiation, GM and artificial fertiliser to produce his crops. He told of the many difficulties he faced every day not least the unexpected changes in the weather, which affected his yields. Also, his battles with pests and vermin, especially pigeons. Organic food may be more expensive but when you learn of the benefits to wildlife and the care taken in food production, not to mention the taste, you know it is worth it. A wonderful talk. Mark sells his produce at East Oxford Community Market, every fortnight in Wallingford, South Oxford at Hinksey Park and Sandford Saturday Market.

There was a very different speaker in October when Tim Pocock, retired Magistrate, outlined the work of the Magistrates' Court. Tim described the different types of offences and punishments, Oxford Crown Court and the people who work full time to support the three Magistrates on the bench. He recounted some fascinating facts, one of which was the date Magistrates' Courts came into being – it was 1361, during the reign of Edward III. At that time Britain was a lawless place when innocence or guilt was determined by forcing horrible and painful tasks onto the accused. The Magistrates' Court was a definite improvement to that and still remains important to the whole of our system of justice as it is the court through which all those accused must be processed

initially. Amazingly Magistrates are volunteers, their only payment is for expenses and although they are trained, they are not legally qualified.

Future Programme: In November we will be discussing 'Perfume' with Holly Cranmer; On 13 December 'A Norwegian Christmas' with Trine Lucy and festive food; 10 January 2024, speaker to be advised and Christmas dinner at St Cross College on 17 January 2024.

The **WI Walking Group** is still going strong, under the leadership of Chris Tilley, and meets every other Friday for friendly conversation and a walk in the beautiful Oxfordshire countryside.

Katherine Victoria Louise Mellanby Herbert (Kate) = 1971-2023

A year ago we as a family had just returned from our family holiday in the Scottish Borders. Little did we know the curveball life was going to throw at us and the strength Kate would show in facing death with dignity, humour,

and love.

Kate was born to her parents in May 1971 in Stirling, Scotland before moving south of the border to grow up with her brother Alex in Amersham and Oxford. Kate was never swayed by public opinion, and she forged her own way never

taking no for an answer and the world was always her oyster. She also never forgot that the world was made up of more than herself.

Kate graduated with Psychology from University of Surrey before undertaking teacher training Southampton and life started! Kate met Stephen in London while living and volunteering at the Oxford Kilburn Club (The OK Club) in 1996 and married in 1999. Stephen and Kate forged their careers on London with Kate working in inner London schools as a reception and year 1 teacher. She wanted to share her love for knowledge with others, especially those from disadvantaged backgrounds and moved onto teaching children with severe learning difficulties in Ealing. Although she only taught for 10 years, those years Kate held fondly with the memories of students and teachers she worked with, and she would often talk affectionately about them as if it were yesterday. As her family grew, Kate and Stephen decided to move out of London to Goring in 2003. Kate gave up her teaching career to raise her family and



village.

Kate was able to walk into a room full of strangers and leave with a room full of friends. I never understood how she did it, but it was because she was more interested in others than herself. She was able to strike up conversation with people without passing judgement, meeting them where they were and making them feel special.

In 2014 Kate took up her role as administrator at Dorchester Abbey. She very quickly established herself as a valued colleague, supporting those through their life events and making sure that things ran smoothly without incident. She was not one that wanted the limelight, nor did she seek praise but rather worked in the background to ensure success. Kate worried about the detail and wanted others' life events to be memorable and special. She took this too into preparing her own funeral in detail, and although she knew that it would be Kate not only leaves her husband, about her, she was more concerned about those she would be leaving behind. Almost 400 people attended her funeral affected with her life. throwing herself into village life, making on the 25 August, which was a testament

to how many people she touched in her life.

In 2019 Kate, after a hard journey, was diagnosed with Chronic Leukaemia which had resulted in her hospitalisation both in Turkey and at home. It was a difficult journey for her and her family feeling the that medical profession had made the journey more difficult than need be and was not afraid to articulate this to her clinicians, not to bring judgement but rather so

lifelong friends across all walks of the that others would not need to suffer the shortcomings of the clinical profession. Again, thinking of others before herself. She joined patient participation groups, worked with Oxford University Hospitals and The Royal Marsden on review of patient information leaflets emphasising the fact that a doctor patent relationship is not hierarchical, but rather one built on mutual consent and understanding.

> In January 2023 Kate was diagnosed with Metastatic Pancreatic cancer and the last six months of her life were hard. both for her and her family, but she faced these with a strength and assurance that she had run a good race. She was, right to the end, wanting to make sure that all those she left behind were taken care of and that her family were to be looked after. Even in times of pain, fear, and sadness, she managed to always have a smile for those who visited her. She really was a woman who cared for all those around her.

Mum made it to 97! It all started in Charmouth where she spent her childhood. Her dad was a market gardener, and her mum ran a small guesthouse. She was quite shy as a child but started talking to compensate and never really stopped.

Mum and her family moved to Blandford where she worked in the post office. She met Allan, who was a bank clerk at the time. They married and then had Tim a couple of years later.

As Allan was promoted they had lots of moves around the South West to Gillingham, Tavistock, St Austell and finally Combe Martin. Mum left friends in all these places and regularly kept in touch. Sadly Allan died in 1987.

Puzzles - She loved doing puzzles and setting them too. Some were published in WI puzzle books and for many years she provided a monthly puzzle for

Knitting - She was a very good knitter and many friends and relatives had personalized jumpers from her. She even made knitted swimming trunks for me, but that was perhaps a step too far.

Tea - Wherever we went the first thing mum wanted was a cup of tea. She also helped in the Abbey tearoom for many years and then made four cakes a week for them well into her 80s. She was proud to have her recipes in the Tearoom cookbooks and family and friends could be guaranteed a book at Christmas when they were published.

WI. - Rene joined Dorchester Women's Institute as soon as we moved to

Dorchester. She loved being a WI member and always wanted to go to meetings ,group meetings and represented Dorchester at the National AGMs. Several times she went on courses at Denman, the WI college. She enjoyed going to learn new things and to meet new people. She was sad, as were many members, when the Dorchester WI closed in 2018.

Grandchildren - For the last 30 years her great love has been her grandchildren Sara and Allan, and lately her great granddaughter Cleo. She was always generous to her family and friends. Sara and Allan remember trips to Granny's on Christmas morning to pick up sacks of presents. When they look back at old family photos she was always in the background. From birthdays and Christmas to school plays and Mayday dancing. As they grew older it was graduations and Sara's wedding to Tom. When Cleo was born two years ago, Great Granny loved seeing her. When Mum moved into the home part of most visits was seeing Sara or Allan, and particularly Cleo, whether in person or on





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SODC Cabinet approves new Dorchester and Overy Conservation area boundaries

At its recent meeting, the SODC cabinet agreed to adopt the Overy Conservation Area boundary, and adopt the joint Dorchester-on-Thames and Overy Conservation Area Appraisal and Management Plan, as amended following public consultation, as a Supplementary Planning Document as part of the Development Plan evidence, making it a material planning consideration. This provides very strong planning protection for much of the village.

Berinsfield Community Delivery Plan approved

After consultation with officers and members of the Berinsfield Garden Village Steering Group, a comprehensive delivery plan has been developed which has a focus on a variety of different objectives to enable investment into the built environment, facilities, the people, and organisations within Berinsfield.

Officers have worked to identify and allocate funding to the 27 projects in the plan. While some are led by SODC, some such as the Neighbourhood Plan are led by the Parish Council, or the Mount Farm strategic site masterplanning is led by Ptarmigan Land/JTP, or indeed the County Council. Progress on the plan will be reported regularly to the Steering Group meetings.

The plan also allows SODC to accept £60,000 in additional public health funding for the work on community wellbeing, and to look for further funds from outside sources such as the Shared Prosperity Fund.

New Air Quality Website

A new Oxfordshire air quality website has launched providing air quality guidance and resources for the county. The website (www.oxonair.uk) aims to integrate all relevant air quality-related information from all district councils in Oxfordshire under one single platform.

The website also continues to feature a map and real-time readings of monitoring stations across Oxfordshire including NO_2 , $PM_{2.5}$ and PM_{10} , as well as general advice on air quality, why it is important, and how it is monitored across the county.

Across Oxfordshire in 2021, it was estimated that air pollution's effect on mortality was equivalent to 320 early deaths.

'Check it before you chuck it'

South Oxfordshire District Council have launched a new campaign asking people to check before they chuck items in their recycling bins as part of a drive to increase the amount and quality of recycling in the district.

An estimated 3,340 tonnes* – the equivalent of just over 200 double decker buses – of items that residents put in their recycling bins during 2022/23 were not actually recyclable – that's 11 per cent of all the contents of our green bins for the whole year!

It can be very difficult to remove non-recyclable items out of the large loads of recycling in our collection trucks or at the recycling facility; and if it's food waste or other messy items then it could result in whole truckloads of recycling having to be rejected.

You've probably noticed stickers on your green household recycling bin encouraging you to 'Check it before you chuck it'.

By ensuring you only put the correct items in your recycling bin, you will play your part in helping to keep us among the top recyclers in the country! Scan the QR code on the sticker or go to **southandvale.gov.uk/checkit**

SODC Issues its latest 5-year Housing Land Supply Statement

The latest statement indicates that SODC has a 4.2 year supply of housing and can be downloaded (all 381 pages) from the SODC website. Clearly this is a concerning, if not unexpected, outcome to this painstaking and time-consuming exercise, but we are confident that we can robustly defend any major speculative planning refusals because our Local Plan is up to date with a strong policy base and our recent record of delivery has been strong. Developer-side delays and market conditions mean that the build-out has been slower than hoped.

Indeed, recent appeals (e.g. one in Chalgrove) have been lost by developers, due to other factors which the inspector felt were more compelling.

We still await Government action on this inefficient and unfair rule, despite the Secretary of State's comments on scrapping it early in 2023. However, it is clear that Neighbourhood Plans will continue to be extremely important, and the Green Belt is still a very strong protection against unplanned development, as indeed is Conservation Area status.

Special educational needs and disabilities Ofsted report

Oxfordshire's local area partnership (LAP), which includes both Oxfordshire County Council and local NHS agencies and hospitals, has apologised to families and has committed to significant change to improve support for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) following an inspection of services by Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission in July.

Inspectors identified that there are widespread systemic failings across the local area partnership leading to significant concerns about the experiences and outcomes of children and young people with SEND, which must be urgently addressed.

Areas identified for improvement include:

- Agencies within the local area partnership need to work cohesively to ensure that children and young people get the right help at the right time.
- Too many children and young people are unable to access the education provision they need.

The inspection recognised that the timeliness of education, health and care plans (EHCPs) has recently improved, but frequently they do not describe the child or young person accurately enough to ensure that their needs are met effectively.

Given the report also stated better leadership is needed, OCC leader Liz Leffman asked the cabinet member for Children's Services, Liz Brighouse, who is also Labour group leader, to step down from that particular role. Instead, Labour decided to leave the county administration, which is now led by the Lib Dem and Green group only. This has meant changes to OCC's Cabinet, including a new post focusing entirely on SEND improvement. The creation of this new cabinet role dedicated to SEND will ensure that the whole council has a constant and permanent focus on turning the situation around at pace.

Councillor Calum Miller has decided to step down from the role of cabinet member for finance and will be replaced by Councillor Dan Levy.

Green Party Councillor Pete Sudbury has been appointed Deputy Leader and continues as Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment.

Oxford United proposal for use of County Council land for its new stadium

At its meeting on 19 September 2023, the council's Cabinet approved in principle the leasing of land at the 'Triangle' to the football club to develop a new stadium. The leasehold comes with several conditions:

- The club must be given planning permission by Cherwell District Council.
- The club must produce a net-zero plan that is fully costed and comes with clear timescales and outcomes from design, construction and full operation of the stadium.
- The club must provide details of how it will meet the commitments made in its submissions to the county council so far.
- Restrictive covenants will be put in place that will set aside
 the use of the land for football/community sports and leisure/
 sports stadia for the term of the lease, with limited
 commercial activities permitted only within the stadium
 footprint.

HIF1 planning application update

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Following a recent planning and regulation committee meeting, the council's Planning Authority has decided to take a neutral position at the forthcoming inquiry on the HIF1 road project, although maintaining some objections on specific planning issues. It has also emerged that the July call-in was requested by Defense Minister Grant Shapps on the basis of the growth plans for the UK's nuclear fusion industry at Culham Science Centre.

I have asked for details to be brought forward on how the scheme will connect to existing active travel routes and what will happen where the road ends (halfway along the road between Clifton Hampden and Golden Balls roundabout).

The structure of Government, national and local, can be confusing. When someone needs help with something it can be difficult to know just who is responsible for what, and therefore who can help when things do not go as they should. I often receive requests from people to help them with issues that are not Parliamentary matters and with which I cannot help. I appreciate that this can be frustrating and so I thought that it might be helpful if I set out who does what.

It is often thought that an MP sits at the top of a hierarchy of Government and has power to direct local councils. This is not the case. Local councils are autonomous, and MPs do not have any jurisdiction over local council decisions. Hence local councils have their own elected representatives in the form of councillors. People elected to these councils have direct access to officers at the respective councils and so are better placed to take up relevant issues. I have found that referring to local councillors is the quickest way to get action. Some local council teams can be quick to respond to me but of late some have started treating concerns raised via my office as formal complaints and as such can take several weeks to be processed.

So, to help steer through the hierarchy let me set out who does what.

Essentially as an MP I can help with issues and concerns that relate to central government departments. For example this may include issues relating to the HM Revenue and Customs, Visas and immigration, the NHS, or pensions and benefit issues.

In Oxfordshire we have three tiers of local government, the County Council, District Councils and Parish Councils or Parish Meetings.

Oxfordshire County Council is responsible for local services, including education, social services, transport, roads (except trunk roads and motorways), public rights of way, libraries, the fire service, culture, trading standards, bus subsidies, minerals, waste and recycling (disposal) and the environment.

The constituency is served by two district councils, Cherwell District Council and South Oxfordshire District Council. They are responsible for local services, including planning, housing and associated benefits, rubbish collection, environmental services, leisure services, some car parks and council tax collection.

Parish Councils and Parish Meetings deal with very local concerns and can influence the other councils on behalf of residents.

Whilst on the topic of what I can and cannot do it may also be helpful to comment on requests to attend specific events. When Parliament is sitting MPs are expected to be in Westminster from Monday to Thursday, unless on other parliamentary business elsewhere. During a week in Westminster there are many competing demands such as scrutinising legislation, attending debates, ministerial question sessions, committees, briefings and other meetings. These competing demands mean that it is not always possible to attend a particular debate or drop-in session that a constituent may ask me to attend. When I cannot attend something it does not reflect lack of interest, simply that I cannot be in two places at once.

I hope that setting this out is helpful and answers several questions that I have been asked of late.


