For the fifth year in a row, South Oxfordshire District Council is amongst the top five councils in England for the proportion of household waste that is recycled, and this year they are number one! SODC has even moved ahead of Vale of White Horse, who were pushed into third place by Three Rivers. In South Oxfordshire the household waste recycling rate in 2022/23 was 61.6% against an average of 41.2% for England overall.

Clearly this isn't a race, but it is important in the effort to combat climate change by reducing energy use and extraction of minerals, according to the United Nations. It reduces pollution and contributes to more sustainable lifestyles.

We may sometimes get frustrated when our bins are not emptied on due dates, as we see on social media. But the effort to properly sort our waste into the correct bins really does help the processes put in place by SODC to be England leaders in this.

As households we can also help by creating less waste by reusing and recycling whatever we can. And Dorchester is generally good at this. We see evidence all around Dorchester with unwanted items from one household being offered to anyone who can use them, whether that be through social media or simply by leaving them outside the Doing this is both a contribution to the village community and to reducing climate change. Let's keep it up.

#### **Talking Point**

#### Rev'd Sorrel Shamel-Wood

Easter is a time when we celebrate new life. The shops are filled with displays featuring pastel-coloured eggs, bouncing lambs and cheeky chicks. The festival coincides with the onset of Springtime, when the days become longer and brighter and our local farms are bursting with new life. Visiting the lambs is becoming an increasingly popular activity for families, rivalling the pumpkin picking craze that continues to soar in popularity during the October halfterm holiday.

Of course, for Christians, Easter is the festival celebrating the resurrection life of Jesus Christ. Christians believe that, on Easter Sunday, Jesus rose from the grave, heralding a great celebration and a promise of new, glorious, eternal life. The image of the rising Sun is symbolic for Christians at this time of year, with many offering a dawn service to celebrate Easter Sunday as the first morning light creeps up over the hillside. For Christians, this is one of the holiest and most special times of year, and we give thanks to God not just for all created life, but for the

particular good news of Jesus.

However, Easter Sunday is the culmination of Holy Week, which is a dramatic and intense journey of intense ups and downs. On Palm Sunday (the Sunday before Easter), Jesus was celebrated by the crowds as a hero when he rode into Jerusalem on a donkey. On Maundy Thursday, he shared a final meal with his closest friends before being betrayed by them. On Good Friday, he was crucified. On Holy Saturday, nothing happened: Jesus lay dead in the grave and his friends hid in fear, thinking that was the end of the story.

In the run up to the glorious celebration of resurrection life, there are many moments of despair, death and darkness. We know this to be true in the natural world as well: before Spring time bursts out in all its beauty and colour, first the Autumn leaves must die and rot into the ground. First we must go through the darkest and coldest time of year, when nothing seems to be growing. We know that death and darkness are part of the cycle of life.

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I have found that, depending on where I am in the journey of life, different parts of the Easter story resonate with me in different years. Some years, I am most excited for the joyous celebration of Easter. At other years, it is the profound reality of Good Friday where I feel closest to God. During the lockdown of 2020, I felt that I was most compelled by Holy Saturday: the day when nothing happened. I wonder which day of the story most resonates with you this year?

A long and full life, and any great adventure story, is full of moments of excitement and celebration as well as times of boredom, frustration and grief. Pray that wherever you are on life's journey, you would find comfort, healing, strength and community. Please know that you are very welcome to come and journey with us as we remember the Easter story, at any or all of our Holy Week services across the Dorchester Team this year. Or if you are too frail but would like a pastoral visit or to receive communion, please do get in touch.

# Hempcroft Allotments March

At the AGM in 2021 there was lively debate on a number of issues, and one concern discussed was the use of chemicals to control weeds on the allotments or on the pathways. There have been instances of the chemicals damaging crops on adjacent plots. Jon Rosby had contacted the National Society of Allotment and Leisure Gardeners (NSALG) to see if they had guidance on this issue. They have provided advice and a standard policy, and our insurers now also require a policy on the use of herbicides and pesticides. The NSALG policy is to allow the use of herbicides such as glyphosate at the strength level commercially available in garden centres in a carefully controlled manner. Because of past indiscriminate use by some plot holders there was a strong feeling that all herbicides should be banned and this went to the vote with the overall majority of those present supporting a ban. It was agreed that the whole membership should be consulted on this issue. After full consultation in with the membership in 2022 the consensus was that industrial strength glyphosate should be banned on the allotments but that the careful use of glyphosate at the strength level commercially available in garden centres is acceptable, and this is the current policy on the allotments.

There was a report in the papers a few weeks ago that one of the first councils in Britain to ban glyphosate weedkillers has dropped the ban after streets and footpaths became choked with weeds. Brighton and Hove was branded 'a city of triffids' after the council imposed the ban in 2019. Now, after five years of complaints, the council has admitted the situation has become untenable and has voted to reintroduce glyphosate. Councillors said that it was time to take back the streets from the plague of nettles, thistles and weeds that had taken over, and they had a duty to maintain safe streets for residents. Streets and communities that decide to weed their own streets will not be treated with glyphosate. However eco-conscious residents are reported to be furious and say the move will harm wildlife, particularly the starling population. The decision is set to receive final approval at a meeting of the full council in March.

So the wider glyphosate debate continues outside of Dorchester's Hempcroft Allotments.



#### Warborough & Shillingford WI



At the WI Members meeting in January, we had a talk from a real-life CSI, which, as fans of the TV programmes based on this profession will know, stands for Crime Scene Investigator. I

was fascinated as Hayley Scott described what her job involved. CSIs enter the scene of a crime, and work out what has actually happened, search the scene for evidence, identify unknown suspects and it is their job to see if those suspects are actually responsible. They will look for finger marks, footwear marks, bodily fluids, fibres and gunshot residue, among other things. As they are examining the scene they take copious notes, which will be important if the case gets to court, for as Michael Mansfield KC, the famous English barrister, said, 'If it is not written down, it didn't happen'. CSIs are civilians but will appear in court to give evidence on a case they have worked on for their force, for Hayley that was the Met. Hayley now has her own company based around her experience as a CSI, organizing talks, CSI workshops and murder mystery events. 

#### **Geoff Russell retires**

After 26 years in post, on 29 February 2024 Geoff Russell stood down as Clerk to Dorchester-on-Thames Parish Council.

Geoff has served seven chairmen or chairs of the parish council, starting with Jenny Nudds in 1998, running through to the current chair, Mike Corran, by way of Mike Smith, Ken Bryan, Margot Metcalfe, Chris Hill, and Mark Williams, and around 30 different councillors.

The Clerk, says, Geoff, is the Council's 'Proper Officer' which includes being the channel of communication between the Parish Council and the village.

Communication is a two-way process, with the Parish Clerk responsible for informing villagers of forthcoming meetings. These meetings are open for anyone to attend and to raise issues if they so wish. All new planning applications to South Oxfordshire District are referred to the Parish Council for comment and these comments have to be agreed at a Council meeting, which often draws a crowd!

One of the best attended meetings during Geoff's career was held in January 2015 when an estimated 140 people came to the Village Hall to discuss a proposal that the 'Demesne Field', running along the by-pass between Drayton Road and the River Thame, would lose its green belt status.

Another was the launch of the Neighbourhood Development Planning exercise in October 2012. The Plan was produced by a small group of hard-working and dedicated councillors and residents. The finished document was approved in a village referendum in 2018 when it received 95.9% of the votes when the turnout was 416 (51.16%)

In between the monthly meetings, the Clerk is often the preferred first point of contact for residents with a local government related question. Over the years Geoff has tried to keep in touch with a wide range of County and District Council departments and officials so that he is able to advise each resident how best to achieve the resolution of their problem – often something way beyond the power of the Parish Council.

One of the main changes that Geoff has seen in his time as Clerk, has been the advance of technology, albeit slowly at first. For example, it was only in 2012 that the practice of minutes being hand-written in a bound volume was dopped in favour of typed pages in a loose-leaf binder and going back to Geoff's





early days, the then chairman, Mike Smith, would knock on Geoff's door each evening to see whether Geoff had any messages or updates for him. All now replaced by email and WhatsApp!

Nowadays there are several training courses available for both councillors and clerks which are provided both on-line and in person, but back in 1998 when Geoff became Clerk his induction and training were provided by the experienced team of existing Dorchester councillors, including Maurice Day who had been a member of the Council since 1983 and had already served as chairman. Prior to being on the Council, Maurice had served as the local police officer, and this must have further enhanced his local knowledge! For many years, therefore, many council and village queries could be answered by referring them to Maurice, who knew exactly what had happened in a previous situation and how it was dealt with. 'We were asking Maurice,' says Geoff, 'for a long time before we started asking Google!' It has taken the internet to replace you, Maurice.

Responsibility for managing the Cemetery off Drayton Road falls to the Parish Council, which also owns the land. Only residents of the village and those who can demonstrate a connection with Dorchester have the right of burial, and the allocation of spaces for burials and the interment of ashes has been managed by the Parish Council for more than 125 years.



Under such circumstances it is hard to imagine innovation. but this was achieved back in 2004 when it was agreed that the old cemetery gatehouse building should be stabilised, and the interior walls made available for the fixing of commemorative plaques. With such spaces being made available on demand, this has proved to be popular with one family ordering a row of no less that five plaques to honour family memories.

During Geoff's clerkship there have been many occasions when the village has been used as a location for filming - not just Midsomer Murders but several others, too. As well as providing both the Parish Council and the hosting property owners with a useful income at the time, the amazing popularity of Midsomer Murder location tours continues to bring business to the village.

'It has been a huge bonus that I have had so much contact with these film companies and had the opportunity to watch them at work.' says Geoff. 'Great fun and very interesting to be involved. On one occasion, I recall, we even lent a bread knife to the props lady who was working on an Agatha Christie episode being filmed nearby. Was it used as the murder weapon, we wondered?'

'The attention to detail shown by the set designers was amazing to witness. When the Abbey Museum was used, for example, all things displayed on the shelves were replaced by similar items that were correct for the year in which the story was set and when 'The Shambles' was a butchers shop, the smell coming from the set at the end of the day was almost overpowering!'

One of the biggest projects in which Geoff was involved took place between 2005 and 2010 when Dorchester Parish Council received nearly £30,000 grant aid from DEFRA and their 'Hidden Britain' programme. Individual projects involved both Dorchester Abbey and the Abbey Museum and signage all over the village.

The Council continues to provide walks guides and other leaflets which are distributed through hotels and local tourist offices and are available to download from the Village website <a href="https://www.dorchester-on-thames.co.uk/information/walks/">https://www.dorchester-on-thames.co.uk/information/walks/</a> The five 'Orientation Boards' that were created in 2006/7 are all about to be refreshed and updated.

Another legacy of which Geoff is particularly proud is the series of village celebrations to commemorate national occasions. These include the Millenium, Queen Elizabeth II's Golden, Diamond and Platinum Jubilees, and the Coronation of King Charles III. As Parish Clerk, Geoff played a key role in organising many of the essentials that go to make up a successful event, such as getting road closures, hiring toilets, and sourcing commemorative memorabilia, often mugs sourced from Aston Pottery near Bampton, but including a bookmark in 2022 for the Platinum Jubilee.

The other source of satisfaction is the now established 'What's On' evenings, celebrating village activities and societies in the Village Hall with stands to allow them to display their prowess and recruit new participants which Geoff has organised for several years. Originally conceived back in 2005 as a 'Newcomers' Evening' to let recent arrivals to Dorchester know of the range of activities in which they could participate, they have now become open to all and a popular event in the village calendar.

Geoff says that an unexpected benefit of being Parish Clerk came well away from Dorchester. When travelling to China Geoff was able to obtain a visa rather more easily by describing himself as a parish clerk rather than by his other profession, journalist. 'I assured the official that the role was not in any way religious,' says Geoff.

Now Geoff has stepped down, although I am sure that he is not totally bowing out of village roles – there is still the Village Hall to be looked after. But we all, I know, want to thank him for so many years of service to the village, and being pivotal in making the community run so smoothly for all those years. Thank you, Geoff.

#### Benson Choral takes a new turn 7.30pm Saturday 23 March Dorchester Abbey

Many big choirs such as ours spend much of their time polishing up the jewels of the past, and my goodness, there are many of them! But then along comes something new, and with it the joy of discovery, learning and sharing.

Such a work is Richard Blackford's *Pietà* (2019). Richard is a distinguished local composer, prominent in many fields, and we were drawn to his *Mirror of Perfection* a few years back. His *Pietà* is based on the powerful and poignant mediaeval poem *Stabat Mater* which depicts Mary's suffering at the foot of the Cross. But he adds some graphic poems from Anna Akhmatova's *Requiem* which give a more modern twist. *Pietà* won Richard the Ivor Novello Composer Award, Choral Category, in 2020.

The other half of the concert is Gabriel Fauré's incomparable *Requiem,* a restrained and reflective work with some memorable melodies, particularly for our tenors, who often get the big tune first!

Directing us for the first time is Jonathon Cole-Swinard who brings his experience as Head of Music and Chorus Director at Garsington Opera, together with two of the soloists from *Pietà*"s Bournemouth première as well as local virtuoso saxophonist Huw Wiggin and the West Forest Sinfonia.

Our Dorchester 2030 survey report is in from Community First Oxfordshire. And, as expected, it shows the passion people in Dorchester have for their community and its surrounding to make sure we have a thriving community and environment to live in in the future.

Around 30% of the village responded which CFO describes as a very good response. Thank you. The full report will be put on our Parish Council website shortly and there will also be a summary of it in next month's Dorchester News for those who don't want to wade through the whole report. To whet your appetite, you can expect to see comments showing real enthusiasm for environmental issues including the rivers, traffic and safety, transport links, affordable housing, our village hall and pavilion and access to the country side and footpaths.

In February and March the Parish Council meetings are sifting through the report and identifying priorities we believe we have the capacity, influence and funds to progress. That does of course, in all likelihood, mean there will be things that we don't prioritise for now. And, as we consider our priorities the Council will also reflect on other local changes which could impact on the development of Dorchester over the next 10 years such as the likelihood of further pressures on OCC & SODC funding of services and the proposed development of Berinsfield Garden Village with up to 1900 homes plus new community facilities.

So, feel free to come along on **6 March** if you want to take part in that debate. This will then lead up to us proposing and agreeing priorities, as a community, at the Annual Parish Meeting on **1 May** in the Abbey and getting started on launching those with the involvement of interested residents as well as councillors. So, please do put that date in your diary and come along as we make decisions and kick things off.

Implementing our vision is definitely going to involve a wider group than just the parish councillors. Plus we know there are skills and energy in the wider community to draw on. So, I would like to thank the 80+ people who have already volunteered to help bring our vision for Dorchester to life. A number of them already do lots of good work in the village so offering to do more shows their real commitment to our community. If you are one of that group who volunteered you should have received an email from me in the last few days, if you didn't then please do contact me on

chairman@dorchesteronthames-pc.gov.uk as it means we have missed you or got your email address wrong. And, of course, if you want to get involved but forgot to say so in the survey, it is never too late, just drop me a line and we'll tell you how you can do your bit.

Residents will have seen the 20mph signs going up promptly after it was approved by OCC. A few people have asked when

the 20mph comes into force legally. The answer is it happened on 12 February. I know some queries have been raised about enforcement. That is something for us to discuss as a community, in reality we are unlikely to see increased police enforcement unless there is evidence of a significant problem and risk to the public. However the evidence that a limit itself does moderate the behaviour of most people is strong so that is a good start. Whether we want to look more creatively at how we enforce it will be something to consider as the limit settles in and we discuss traffic priorities as part of our wider Dorchester 2030 vision.

Finally, as I flagged last month we are currently introducing our new Parish Clerk, Jenny Welham, to Dorchester. And therefore we are saying a goodbye to Geoff Russell in his role as our clerk after a quarter of a century. I'd like to offer my personal thanks alongside those of the other councillors for his support for me as he has done for so many councillors over the years. Rest assured the council will be agreeing a suitable way of saying thank you to Geoff (and Helen). And maybe he'll come to some parish council meetings to keep an eye on us!

#### Berinsfield Garden Village

At the most recent meeting of the Steering Group, many updates were received on the Community Delivery Plan. The plan has helped us to get extra funding from the UK Shared Prosperity fund, which is funding community arts projects and decarbonisation reports for community facilities, and from OCC Public Health, which will be funding a part time Health Development Officer and launching a grant scheme (details tbc) in July.

Officers have also secured funding (around £250K) from UK Shared Prosperity Fund to construct a Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) – site options are being explored and there will be engagement with local residents and groups on potential uses.

We also had updates on Berinsfield PC's Neighbourhood Development Plan and Ptarmigan/JTP's draft masterplan for the Mount Farm site.

## Successful recycling district urges residents to reduce and reuse first!

Residents in South Oxfordshire are officially the best recyclers in the country, according to a government league table published yesterday.

The district council is now encouraging residents to further boost this good work by turning their efforts to reducing and reusing where possible and is now working to create a new waste strategy – which will aim to further this good work and move towards becoming as environmentally sustainable as possible.

The Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) officially published the **recycling performance league table** on 31 January. South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils were placed in the top three of the recycling tables for English local authorities. South Oxfordshire had been ranked the highest for household waste recycling rates in 2022/23 at 61.6%, having already been in the top five for the last five years.





#### **OCC** budget

Oxfordshire County Council cabinet has proposed measures to close its remaining £900,000 budget shortfall for 2024/25. The proposals form part of the final budget which will be decided at the annual budget setting meeting of all 63 county councillors on 20 February.

Although a track record of responsible financial management means that Oxfordshire County Council has been in a more resilient position than many other authorities, the overall position remains extremely challenging.

Councils of all political hues throughout the country have made clear to central government that more funding was needed this year and in following years due to the high levels of pressures in areas such as social care, special educational needs and other services.

While the government has subsequently announced an increase to council funding of a further £600 million nationwide, following warnings of an impending crisis, we won't know how much Oxfordshire will receive or any further details until later this month.

#### **Health and Wellbeing Strategy**

More than a thousand people in Oxfordshire have helped OCC to prepare a **new strategy to improve health outcomes** for local people over the next five years. Three new principles for health success lie at the heart of the strategy: addressing health inequalities; preventing ill-health; and closer collaboration. It's been developed by Oxfordshire's Health and Wellbeing Board – the partnership between local NHS services, the county council, the city and district councils and Healthwatch Oxfordshire. This links well to the Community Profile being developed for Berinsfield, which comes with some public health funding.

#### Road safety and Vision Zero

I have met with officers and asked them to investigate ways to improve safety on the A4074 Dorchester bypass with urgency. Further, the county council has written to the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner (TVPCC) to call for more police action to improve road safety, after the number of people killed or seriously injured on Oxfordshire's roads rose in 2022 – the first increase for many years.

Oxfordshire County Council has made a commitment to **Vision Zero** – the elimination of road deaths and serious injuries by 2050 – and is currently progressing with a strategy and associated action plan to deliver this ambition.

#### Fix My Street changes

In July 2023, the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities called in the planning application for the HIF1 Didcot and surrounding areas major infrastructure project, following the county council's planning and regulation committee's vote to refuse the application.

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




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I was interested to read a review of a discussion programme on Times Radio where people were asked what they thought their MP's role was. It was on the back of feedback from MPs who had been asked about their workload and who reported that the casework load had increased substantially in recent years. Something that I can certainly verify. The comments from listeners as to their expectation of MPs were varied with some thinking that they were there to resolve personal problems as a sort of super Citizens Advice resource. If that is your thinking, I am sorry to disappoint although, with the help of my team, we do our best to help constituents where possible.

As you might imagine the issues raised with me week by week are many and varied. Many emails are campaign emails drafted by a particular lobby group for constituents across the county to send to their MP. However a good number of emails are from constituents who have a particular problem that they want to raise. Some of these I can help with, others I have to steer elsewhere. Among the issues raised it is not infrequent for people to have concerns around NHS services, which is something that I can sometimes help with. Problems with accessing GPs are not uncommon nor are concerns with accessing NHS dentists.

I was therefore pleased to see recent Government announcements which I believe will help with both of these in due course. The Pharmacy First initiative is very welcome. This is an approach to make better use of the skills of pharmacists whereby they can offer treatment for some common health conditions themselves without the need to visit a GP or have a prescription. Pharmacists will be able to treat conditions including sinusitis, sore throat, earache, infected insect bite, impetigo, shingles, and uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women without the need for patients to see a GP or have a prescription. Following the assessment, the pharmacist can then supply the prescriptiononly medicines, including antibiotics and antivirals, to treat the problem. I have always felt that pharmacists have been undervalued and under used and so am delighted to see this avenue for treatment opening up. There has been a good take up across the country and I look forward to seeing many pharmacies in the constituency taking advantage of this to the benefit of all.

I was also pleased to see the launch of the NHS Dental Recovery Plan. I know that it has not always been easy to access NHS dental services in the constituency and this plan seeks to encourage more dentists to offer treatment on the NHS. As always these things take time to roll out and I look forward to seeing this implemented locally with greater access to dental services available through the NHS.


Another common issue raised with me is the state of our roads. Towards the end of last year the Government announced substantial additional funding for resurfacing roads. This money, £8.3 billion, is money redirected from the cancelled Phase 2 of HS2. The money has been fairly redistributed across the country so that the amount committed to the Northern leg will go to the North, the amount committed to the Midlands leg to the Midlands, and the amount saved from the new arrangement for Euston station will be spread across the other regions in the country. The bottom line for us is that Oxfordshire will get a total indicative additional funding allocation of £82,340,000. This will be spread over a period of time from 2023/24 to 2033/34, and in reality it will take that sort of time to plan for and resource the repairs needed. The money will be passed to local highways authorities to spend and, in order to ensure transparency on the spending, the local authorities are required to publish information on their websites on the spending. By mid-March we should see a summary of the plans for the next two years. I am sure many people will watch with interest, and I will certainly be looking to see a fair allocation to rural areas where I believe the state of the roads is particularly poor and where public transport is most lacking.


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#### Wallingford Museum News


